North Farmington seniors voted by a three-to-one margin for Bates while her lead over Sarkisian was 55-34 at Harri-

In the race for Hills city council, Vicki
Barnett, Barry Brickner and Ron Oliverio were the top vote-getters. Sevencharter amendments on the mock ballot
met with mixed results.

Students approved four amendments
to allow the city to create departments,
increase the dollar amount from \$3,000
to \$10,000 for items required to go out
for bids, and reduce the number of petition signatures required to put an ordinance up for a referendum vote.

They also OKd an accompanying proposal to increase from one to two years
the time a city can amend or repeal an
ordinance adopted by referendum.

Students turned thumbe down to proposals to increase pay for elected officials, require internal audits every 10
years instead of five and allow hiring
relatives of municipal employees prior
to city council approval.
