Needing a victory to qualify, Harrison finished 5-4 and made the Division III playoff lineup as a wild-card team, Country Day was an automatic qualifier in Division V with a 6-3 record. Harrison senior Kris Wong tied a school record by kicking three field goals of 40, 47 and 40 yards.
