

School's penny project helps rescue mission

The 300 students of Franklin Road Christian School have found a way to reach out to the community during the Christmas season and year-long. In September and October they collected 72 teddy bears which were sent to children in orphanages in the former Soviet Union. During November and December they have found a way to put "a penny here and a penny there" to good use through the Pontiac Rescue Mission's "Pennies for Kids" campaign. They've found all those hidden pennies in their homes and donated to those in need. The Pennies for Kids campaign is a fundraiser that benefits Innovative Learning Center of Pontiac, a ministry of Pontiac Rescue Mission. It provides a place where homeless men, women and children can learn important skills such as reading, writing, vocabulary and arith-

metic. The program also allows for individuals to obtain their diploma or GED. The Innovative Learning Center also houses the Children's Learning Center, which is an after-school and summer tutorial program, designed to help the youngsters catch up to peers. Some children have given one penny, some hundreds and some thousands. The students have surpassed their goal of 100,000 pennies with still a week of campaigning to go. Each penny given will be used to educate and elevate those who would otherwise not have the opportunity to gain skills necessary to become productive community members. In the spring, the students plan to collect diapers and baby formula for Another Way Crisis Pregnancy Center. The final project of the year will be the collection of dog and cat food for the Michigan Humane Society.

A July wedding is planned at St. Colette Catholic Church in Livonia.

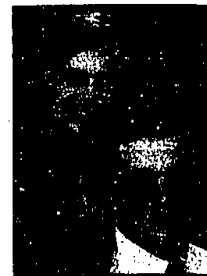
