Farmington Hills police arrest-ed a 35-year-old Hills man and his passenger in connection with a construction site theft. You At in denadiry Initially, the driver told offi-cers he and his companion were looking for scrap in the Dump-ster. Police found a tool box, leather tool belt and two spools of wire in the truck. Officers contacted the person whose phone number was listed on the tool box and learned the items were stolen. When questioned further, the driver said he went into the building site and took the tool box and belt, which he intended

to sell in exchange for drug money. He also said his passen-ger had no knowledge of the inci-dent. Police are seeking warrants for both more Police are seeing warrants for both men. During the past months, thieves have stolen several thou-sands of dollars in equipment from Farmington Hills construc-
