Bob the Bear stands quiet sen-tinel on the deck of Jerry and Jenny Reale's Livonia home. Bob used to be a beech tree, growing up through a hole in the corner of the deck.

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
But the tree was dying when the Reales moved in and someone suggested preserving the tree as a sculpture. Ken Bosbell carved the friendly bruin and Jerry Reale stained him a pleasant golden honey color. He now holds a bouquet of flowers in summer and is appropriately decorated for Halloween and Christmas.

And, no doubt, Bob has been an inspiration to the Reales in choosing their vacations. This past year they went searching for bear in Montana and Alberta. "We went three years ago to Yellowstone, the Badlands, the Tetons and Glickier and we liked (lonier so much that we wanted to go back and this time wanted to sexperience Banff and Jasper, said Jenny Reale.

This was a first for the Reale's sons, Nick, an eighth grader at Livonia's Holmes Junior High, and Jonathan, a fourth grader at Marshall Elementary.

to wake up in the park and not have to drive a distance to get there."

She recommended contacting the parks at least five menths in advance to get accommodulations.

The Reales flew into Montana and rented a deep, on which they racked up more than 2,000 miles during their 11 day trip in August.

The Reales tried horsoback riding a Glacier, but their floor trails and short, through woods and up lateep mountain slopes in search of wildlife.

"We would look everywhere for animals," Jenny said. "We saw alto of mountain goats."

They also saw marmots, elk, squirrels, coyotes and many birds, but only one bear.

"On one trail we spotted a grizzly, but fortunately... or unfortunately for my husband, because his goal was to find a grizzly bear. My husband is a veterinar," she said, as if to explain his odd search.

The Reales checked the inter-net before traveling and were well informed about bears and other information about Glacier (www.nps.gov.glac).

The site gives these bits of information about the grizzly. When it stands on its hind legs it rises six feet tall, sometimes weighing up to 1,400 pounds (though 300.600 is average). It's claws are four inches long and though its vision is "mediocre" it has an excellent sense of smell. And it's omnivorous, which means it will eat just about anything!

And don't even think about running away. The big grizzly could take on Michael Johnson as it sprints 180 feet in three seconds!
The park advises that you don't surprise bears, make pairs.

The park advises that you don't surprise bears, make noise and let them know you're coming, don't get close, avoid walking around blind corners, back walk slowly (unless it agitates the bear) and, whatever you do, don't look a bear directly in the eye because he doesn't like it.

Fortunately, most of the bears the Reales encountered were cousins to Bob, carved out of trees and very popular western souvenirs.

"We saw them everywhere we went," said Jenny, who bought a small one to keep Bob company on the deck.


What the Peales statements

What the Reales did see, were some of the most beautiful scenery in the United States and Canada. They hiked up to the Columbia Ice Fields. Jerry went trout fishing on Maligne Lake, considered one of the most beautiful in the world. One Web site says it is even more beautiful than its more publicized neighbor, Lake Louise.

"The mountains are breathtak-ing, so different from what we're used to," Jenny said.
The Reales made their first trip west on their honeymoon in 1975 to California's Crater Lake and have been going back ever since.
