

St. Mary's overcomes Rice, faces CC for championship

Here's the good news for Orchard Lake St. Mary's: The Eagles beat Birmingham Brother Rice to win the Catholic League Central-West Division football title Saturday, 34-13.

St. Mary's will have the opportunity to defend its Catholic League championship in the Prep Bowl — but now the bad news. The Eagles (7-1) must overcome powerful Redford Catholic Central to retain their league crown.

The Shamrocks (7-0) are the defending Class AA champions and the state's No. 1-ranked team. The Prep Bowl game is scheduled for 7 p.m. Saturday at the Pontiac Silverdome.

It was great to win the division title, but now we get the biggest present of all by having to play the No. 1 team in the state," St. Mary's coach George Porritt said.

The Eagles broke open a close game with Rice by outscoring the visiting Warriors 14-0 in the second half.

"Brother Rice plays a great defensive game," Porritt said. "We knew we had to fly off the ball, because they have some size. We beat a great football team, and I'm so pleased for the kids."

St. Mary's scored on its opening possession on a 23-yard run by junior quarterback Jermaine Gonzales.

The Warriors (6-2) tied the game late in the first quarter when senior captain Mike Scott ran 11 yards up the middle. The Eagles developed a short-

passing game in the second quarter and took the lead for good with a pair of touchdowns just three minutes apart.

Gonzales tossed a 24-yard TD pass to sophomore Grant Minceo and a 27-yard scoring pass to senior flanker Larry Clark.

The Warriors got back in the game by scoring with just 23 seconds left in the second quarter. Junior fullback Mark Gobel powered his way up the middle from 4 yards as Rice cut St. Mary's lead to 20-13.

Whatever momentum Rice had before halftime was quickly reversed by St. Mary's early in the third quarter.

The Warriors received the second-half kickoff but were forced to punt from their own 40. Matt Mueller boomed the ball to the St. Mary's 25 into the hands of Mason, who returned the punt 75 yards or a TD.

St. Mary's forced its final touchdown on a 2-yard run by James Gonzalez.

"(The Eagles) have talent and a lot of skilled players," Rice coach Al Fracassa said. "It seemed as if every time they scored it was a big play. We said if we could stop their big plays we might have a chance to win. But we couldn't stop them."

Porritt agreed Mason's punt return was the key play.

"I was worried after (Rice) scored just before halftime," he said. "That game was nip-and-tuck, but I thought the punt return really broke it open."

Fracassa believes the Eagles have the talent to cause prob-

lems for the Shamrocks, who defeated Rice, 35-14.

"I think they should be able to give Catholic Central a battle if they play us well against them as they did against us," he said.

REDFORD CC 41, UD JESUIT 0: The Shamrocks posted their third shutout of the season Saturday, whipping the University of Detroit-Jesuit.

CC followed up 21 first-half points with 20 more in the second half. CC rolled up 418 total yards, including 301 rushing on 44 carries. Senior quarterback Dave Lusk completed three of five passes for 117 yards.

The Shamrocks had 18 first downs to Jesuit's six. The Cubs were limited to 7 net yards rushing on 26 attempts and 95 yards passing.

Coey Rogowski had 32 yards on six carries and led CC with three touchdowns on runs of 1, 2 and 4 yards.

Junior John Kara scored on runs of 19 and 2 yards and finished with 63 yards in seven carries. Senior Mike Wilk had the other CC score, an 8-yard run as one of his eight carries for 45 yards.

Senior Kyle Entsminger led CC rushers with 69 yards in 10 attempts. The Shamrocks scored on drives of 51, 80, 80, 66 and 49 yards. Their only short scoring possession came after Nick Kato returned an interception 20 yards to the UD 23, and Wilk scored four plays later in the fourth quarter.

The Shamrocks touched two fumbles and each led to touchdowns. Aaron Griffin and Lou Willoughby made the recoveries.

CC also used a 28-yard pass to senior tight end Nick Drzewinski on third-and-3 to set up its second touchdown.

Senior Broce Naysmith led CC with 10 tackles. Kato had the only sack and seven stops. Rogowski had six tackles.

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safety on defense, intercepted a Nick Hudson pass in the Harrison and zone this time.

"Ricky Bryant is one of the best high school football players I've ever seen," Gordon said. "(The receiver) was open and Bryant recovered and made a tremendous play."

Harrison took advantage of a bad punt, getting the ball at the Glenn 31. Pesci passed to tight end Mike Head, who ran most of the 21 yards for the go-ahead TD, carrying one defender across the goal line and running over another with 3:12 left in the half.

The Hawks got the ball back at midfield with 33 seconds remaining. In a repeat of its win over Walled Lake Western, Harrison scored again on the same two plays.

"It was deja vu," Herrington said. "Dave called the same pass play and ran it in the same way."

From shotgun formation, Pesci threw a 41-yard pass to Brian Nelson and ran the final 9 yards for the TD and a 20-7 halftime lead.

"They just didn't cover (Nelson)," Pesci said. "It was almost like they didn't see him. I was trying to get the ball snapped as quickly as I could, just put some air under it and get it to him."

"(From the 9) coach wanted to start with a fade to Ricky. I said 'Coach, let's try the curl first and if it doesn't work, call timeout and go to Ricky. I expected to run it more than throw it with their (spread) coverage."

The Rockets dominated the third quarter, holding the ball for all but 37 seconds of the first 14:01 in the second half and capitalizing on a Harrison turnover to get within a touchdown early in the fourth quarter.

"We felt we had to possess the ball on offense, so they didn't have the ball," Gordon said. "Reggie is a fierce competitor, and he played extremely hard today against a good team."

Glenn used the first 7:42 with a 15-play drive that stalled at the Harrison 11. But the Rockets got the ball back when the Hawks fumbled on second down at their own 35.

Glenn scored in nine plays with the help of a pass interference penalty. On a screen pass, Eric Jones slipped and his knee appeared to touch the ground behind the line, but it ended up being a 4-yard gain.

Then, on fourth-and-4 at the 20, Spearman gained 7 yards to keep the drive going.

"I thought it wasn't going to be our day, possibly," Herrington said. "We stopped them, fumbled and gave them momentum. I said 'Something big is going to happen.'"

"We held them pretty well, as far as no long gains, but they kept moving the chains. They weren't afraid to give it to (Spearman) on third-and-4."

With the score 20-14, an off-sides penalty — Glenn's only one all afternoon — on third-and-1 at the Glenn 37 caused the Rockets to punt and give up the ball.

Harrison's Joe Ghunnam,

who kicked two extra points, scooped a low snap and boomed a 46-yard punt into the wind.

Glenn had one last chance starting at its 21 with 43 seconds left. Hudson was second-one and threw three incomplete passes.

The Rockets scored first after recovering a fumble on the opening kickoff at the Harrison 30. Spearman carried on six of the seven plays, and the first of two Nick Paddock extra points made it 7-0.

"That was a boost, but we also know, when you're playing Harrison, it's a full 48 minutes," Gordon said.

Harrison had a 233-205 edge in total yardage. Pesci was 7-of-12 for 126 yards. Head and Andre Davis caught two passes each for 33 yards. Tailback Matt Reed rushed for 70 yards on 18 attempts, and Bryant had four carries for 46 yards.

"We didn't go deep too much today," Pesci said. "We went with the intermediate routes; the flats were open all day."

Other than the pass to Nelson, we didn't have any big plays. The running game actually opened up the passing game."

"We thought we had a chance to match up with them in the secondary, because we have some speed and athletics back there," Gordon said.

"You're not going to shut them down the whole game, but we had some consistency back there."

Jones had five carries for 23 yards and caught two passes for 18 yards.


