"It was hard to score because I was being sandwiched the whole night," said Kiplela, referring to North's double-team defense. "I just did what I had to do at the free-throw line, even though I shot a couple bricks."


"So we freed the perimeter players up instead of going inside to Kim. That swhy her points were harder, and (North) did a good job of fronting and backing her inside."
