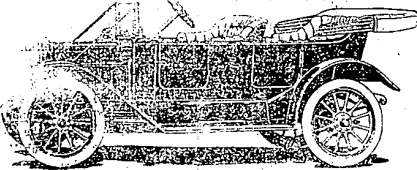

MILK PRODUCERS ARE ORGANIZING WAYNE COUNTY'S GOOD ROAD WORK

Officers of Local Association Chosen Last Saturday

It really looks as though the farmers intended to get together on the milk question. The meeting in Farmington last Saturday was attended by about 175 producers who thoroughly discussed the situation and then formed an organization by selecting Fred Goers for president; Riley A. Ames, vice president; C. H. Ely, secretary, and John Johnson, treasurer. The next meeting is to be held on the last Saturday in the month which will be Feb. 24.

On Friday afternoon of this week another meeting is to be held in Farmington by another class of farmers who are organizing to protect themselves from the Detroit board of health. This association has no name as yet, but it is expected that possibly they may yet affiliate with the Oakland association.

Next week Saturday a general meeting of the milk producers will be held in Union hall, 232 Gratiot avenue, Detroit, and probably Farmington will be represented.

Big Crowd Saw Farmington Win

A record-breaking crowd witnessed the three games of basketball in our local hall Saturday evening.

In the first game our Farmington Juniors went down to defeat at the hands of the Redford Midgets.

In the second game, however, Farmington scored a decided victory, Farmington High winning over Northville to the score of 15 to 24. Our high school boys put up a splendid game. They went in to win and in that spirit pulled down the victory.

The closing game was a hard fought battle, the heavyweight Oakland Motor Works Co.'s team of Pontiac putting up a furious battle against the Farmington Independents. It was as exciting a game as has ever been witnessed on the home floor. The Oaklands doubled the score on our boys in the first half, 7 to 14. In the last half, however, Farmington settled down to good earnest work and the final score was 22 to 35 in Farmington's favor. Our lads had to work for it though.

Our floor is small and consequently the players are close together and a few accidents are sure to result. Some of the players had the wind knocked out of them, while a more serious accident happened to Divisional Superintendent John Clarke, who lost one of his front teeth in the game. He collided with Earl Wolfe very violently, knocking the tooth out. Earl later found the tooth imbedded in his scalp. Nobody seriously hurt, however.

A Good Chance for a Sleighride

The Farmington Guild holds its February meeting next Monday evening, Feb. 12, at the home of Earl Wolfe. Teams and sleighs are being provided by Mr. Wolfe to carry the members from the village to his home. Lunch will be served and a splendid Lincoln program given, consisting of excellent music, readings, etc., in commemoration of the birthday of our great martyred president.

The members of the Guild and their friends who are present will be brought back as far as the Base Line, where they can take the car for home if it is a stormy night. If it is fair weather the teams will bring them all the way to the village. Everybody is welcome.

Concrete Road Will Connect With the Farmington Gravel Road Next Spring

With the proceeds from the sale of \$500,000 worth of Wayne county road bonds, which will be available about the first of March, a very comprehensive program has been outlined for the coming season by Road Commissioners Hines, Hagerty and Butler. Michigan avenue road, which is now completed to the village of Wayne, 18 miles from the city hall in Detroit will be completed to the Washtenaw county line, including the road of the villages of Wayne and Dearborn. Grand River road will be built to the Oakland County line, starting from where the commission left off in 1911 and continuing through the village of Redford. River road will be built to the Monroe county line via Rockwood, including the stretch of bad road in the village of Treenon. This will make it a through road with no breaks, and finish Wayne county's share of the proposed Detroit Toledo road.

Plymouth road will also be completed from Plymouth to Detroit, a distance of about 17 miles. Of this 17 miles, 9 are now practically finished. This road will be the only gravel road undertaken during the coming season. VanDyke and Mt. Elliott roads will be built to the Macomb county line.

With the completion of these main trunk roads a traveler will be able to leave Detroit and go to the county line over nine different roads in different directions. Fort road, Eureka road, which is the leading road into the city of Wyandotte, Warren avenue and Wayne road south, which connects up the villages of Wayne and Romulus, will also have long stretches built on them. All these highways, excepting Plymouth, will be of concrete, and contracts have been awarded for practically all the material to be used. Construction will be started simultaneously on at least five roads and the work will be pushed vigorously so as to have it completed at as early a date as possible.

David Holdershaw Passes Away

Another well-known resident of this locality has passed away. David Holdershaw, who lived two and a half miles north of Farmington, died early Wednesday morning. He had been sick for only a short time with peritonitis.

The funeral is to be held Friday afternoon at 1:30 at the home, the services to be conducted by Revs. G. E. Gullen and D. M. Wirt. The interment will be at the East Farmington cemetery and the funeral arrangements are in charge of R. B. Northrop, the Redford funeral director.

Mr. Holdershaw was 66 years of age and had lived in this country for over thirty years, but was born in England. Besides his wife, he leaves a daughter, Mrs. Clyde Seeley. Thomas Lytle was also a brother-in-law.
