Hawks field veteran squad

Modest improvement.
That's what Farmington Hills Harrison's volleyball squad is looking for this season. With six returning seniors, a move up in the Western Lakes Activities Association is within reach.
"We've finished ninth the past two years," coach Lisa Schrowe said. "We'd like to place at least seventh in the conference this year."
Harrison opened the season yesterday at its home tournament. Eight teams were slated to compete, including defending champ Ann Arbor Pioneer.
The Hawks went into action without one of its top players. Senior Ari Ault, who had been the team's starting setter, will miss the entire season because of a knee injury suffered during the fall basketball campaign.
"It's a huge loss for us," Schrowe said.
Ault alter how Harrison plays offense, Schrowe had planned on a two-setter offense.
"The advantage is that some girls hit better off of certain setters," the coach

explained.
The Hawks will now run a one-setter offense. Schrowe said there are advantages to that scheme, too.
"It means more playing time for the kids and not as many substitutions," she commented.
Brittany Maxey will certainly get her fair share of playing time. The senior co-captain will work at outside hitter.
"Her hitting skills have improved tremendously from last year," Schrowe said.
Crisis Chavez is Farmington Hills other co-captain. An all-conference selection a year ago, the senior has excellent overall skills. Chavez will be Harrison's strong side hitter.
Eva Chavez will be the squad's setter. Schrowe said she has improved her consistency from a year ago.
Ali Ault, a senior, will have several roles. She will see time at weak side hitter and defensive specialist.
"Most of all," Schrowe said, "I think Ali brings experience to the team. I feel confident putting her in any position. She knows

where to be at all times."
Patty Moloney rounds out the list of seniors. She'll be a defensive specialist for the Hawks.
"She's very aggressive," Schrowe said. "She's willing to hit the floor at any opportunity."
Lindsay Emmett falls under the same category. It'll be her first year on varsity.
Emily Jackson will play a new position for the Hawks this year at middle hitter.
"She's doing extremely well at it," Schrowe said. "She's a very strong hitter."
Genelle Welling, a junior, is also playing middle hitter for the first time. Lisa Rosemary completes the roster and will work at weakside hitter.
"She has excellent jumping ability," Schrowe said. "She can get over the net and hit."
While the Hawks will lack height, athletic ability will be a strong suit. Many players are stars in other sports, such as Maxey in tennis and Ault in softball.
"We don't compare to many big hitting teams," Schrowe said in referencing the WLAA. "But I think they'll be surprised at what we will be able to do."

"If one of them can step up and develop quickly," said Moeller, "we can go from a good to a great team."

While the Marlins may be junior heavy, several seniors will play key roles.

One is Mary Gignac. The co-captain is all-league last year

and should provide the Marlins with a powerful hitter.
"She has got a lot of talent," said Moeller.

Look for big things from Carrie Czech.
"She's probably our most improved player," Moeller said.

"She went to three volleyball camps over the summer, lifted weights and worked on her game all fall."

"She has got her confidence this year. She believes she can do it."

Emilyn Jarzembowski rounds out the list of seniors. A third year varsity player, she'll play all positions this season.

Moeller plans on using his starters extensively. The versatility of players like Jarzembowski allows him to do that.

"I think it lets them get into the rhythm of the game more," Moeller said of making fewer substitutions.

Amy Miller returns to the Marlins and will be the setter. The junior held the same position all of last season, which should be a big advantage for Mercy, Moeller said.

"I think the team as a whole will get well because they've played together," he added.

Junior Meghan O'Connor will back up Miller. Carrie Brankiewicz is Mercy's other captain.

"She the strongest athlete on our team," Moeller said. "She's physically very strong. Carrie is a great leader."

Nikki Downing will see plenty of playing time. She'll be a back row specialist.

Junior Kelley Blunden is one of the Marlins most improved players.

In years past, the Catholic League has been dominated by Livonia Ladywood and Harper Woods Regina.

Both squads will have new coaches this winter. For the first time in a long time, the conference race might be wide open.

"I think we have a good shot," Moeller said.

Salem WLAA favorite

Certainly not a bad situation, as first years go.
Not for Tom Teeters, who

takes over as Plymouth Salem volleyball coach for Brian Gilles and Allie Suffely, who resigned after last season.

And not bad for Salem, either, which gets a coach for their already well-developed, championship-level program who has three high school state championships and one NJCAA title to his credit.

It will take Teeters some time to put the pieces in the right spots, but the ingredients are there — the Rocks should be able to keep pace with their illustrious past.

And illustrious is the only way to describe it. In nine years, Gilles and Suffely built Salem into a Western Lakes Activities Association powerhouse in volleyball. The Rocks won their third outright title in the last six seasons last year, posting an 11-0 WLAA match record. Overall, they set school records for wins in a season, finishing 47-6-1 after losing in the state regional final. In the past six years, Salem has an almost incredible 63-3 record in WLAA matches.

Ironically, the team that has been Salem's nemesis the last few years in state tournament competition, and the team that eliminated the Rocks last season, was Livonia Ladywood — coached by Teeters. A disregr-




