County board adopts safety plan

At the Dec. 10 meeting, the Oakknad County Board of Commissioner and opticed by a 21-to-1 wate a plan introduced by Commissioner David Moffitt, chairman of the board's Public Services Committee, to finance and create a unified public safety communication network in Oakland County, allowing police and fire departments to directly communicate with once another.

This is a big step forward for public safety in Gakland County. Presently, police and fire agencies can't talk to each other at emergency seenes, because they are on different radio frequencies from one another. This endangers lives, "Moffitt said.

The board committed to finance unification of countywide public safety agency because they are no different radio frequencies from one another, the condition, and to authorize the county to seek the necessary channels from the Federal Communications, and to authorize the county to seek the necessary channels from the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). The plan will correct the existing fragmented communication system, which left 13 public safety agencies at the scene of the Wixom plant shootings unable to communicate with another."

The committee heard from city of Farmington Hills police Chief William Dwyer and Gary Gass, director of public safety for the city of Farmington, about the communicate on-scene.

Frustration

The plan requires appropriation from the county budget to pay for the improvements. Only if funds are unavailable in the county budget can the project be funded by other means, for example, a surcharge on phone bills. 'In the name of public safety, the county has to 'bite the bullet' before someone 'takes a bullet,' Moffits said.

Permission granted
Public Act 29 of 1994 enables the Board of Commissioners to authorize a telephone surcharge of up to 4 percent for emergency telephone operations. Already, more than 49 counties have adopted this funding mechanism to provide adequate public safety. The plan would authorize, if county funding is unavailable, the telephone companies operating throughout Oakland County to include up to a 4 percent surcharge on telephone lines — thus providing funding for emergency communication equipment and operations. For consumers, this represents a charge of approximately \$0.57 per phone line permonth, with Centrex lines generally counting as only one line.

The upgrading and expansion of Oakland County's 800 MHz system in a manner that would enable all public safety radies to exchange direct communications would cost approximately \$18.1 million for the first year alone. Subsequent years would require funds of up to \$7.7 million for debt service and additional capital outlands.

The upgrading and expansion of Oakland will us with the recently approved federal COPSMORE grant of \$17 million for the instruction of the recomputer aided dispatch into the geographic information system.
