(Summary)

A regular meeting of the Farmington City Council was called to order by Mayor Hartsock at 8:00 p.m. on Monday, January 3, 2000 in Council Chambers, 23600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan. Notice of the meeting was posted in compliance with Public Act 267-1978.

PRESIDENT: Bush, Campbell, Hartsock, McShane, Mitchell.

ABSENT: None.

OTHERS PRESENT: Clerk/Treasurer Cantrell, Attorney Donohue, Director Goss, Director Gushman, City Manager Lauhoff, Assistant City Manager Richards.

The agenda was approved as submitted.

Minutes of the Special and Regular meetings of December 6, 1999 and the Joint Council meeting of November 18, 1999 with Farmington/Farmington Hills City Councils and 47th District Council were approved as submitted.

Minutes of other Boards were received and filed.

Susanee Paul and Denise Twyney updated Council on the Civic Theatre Gala Weekend scheduled for January 7-9, 2000.

Council issued a proclamation proclaiming January 17-23, 2000 as "Martin Luther King, Jr. Week".

Council appointed Daniel Ludwig to the Zoning Board of Appeals to a 3-year term and James Atkinson to the Historical Commission to a 3-year term.

Council adopted a 2000 Goal Statement.

Council established the Warner Mansion Committee, effective February 1, 2000.

Council approved the Public Safety Officers Association tentative collective bargaining agreement.

Council requested that the Liquor Control Commission be notified that they found no objection to the Commission issuing new SDD licenses to Mr. Maunaud Zators, owner of the 9-Grand Party Store at 30700-30708 Grand River, and Borman's Inc., owner of Farmer Jack at 22125 Farmington Road.

Council adopted a resolution to indemnify the State from liability created by the City's work force in the State trunkline right-of-way.

Council approved continued membership in the Michigan Municipal League, including the Legal Defense Fund and authorized payment of the annual dues in the amount of \$5,123.

Council introduced Ordinance No. C-663-2000 to amend Chapter 35 of the City Zoning Code, amending Section 35-162, subsection (f) regarding front yard setbacks in the Central Business District; introduced Ordinance No. C-664-2000 to amend Chapter 35 of the City Zoning Code amending section 35-180 Lighting, regarding exterior illumination of buildings and introduced Ordinance No. C-665-2000 to amend Chapter 35 of the City Zoning Code adding Section 35-226 Dumpsters, requiring that dumpsters be kept planned in all the nonresidential districts requiring screening and setting, as determined by the Planning Commission.

Council introduced Ordinance No. C-662-2000 to amend Chapter 16, Garbage and Rubbish of the City Code by adding a new Section 16.26.5, Dumpsters Provided Upon Public Parking Lots.

Council authorized the purchase of 1 Public Safety administrative vehicle at \$16,403 through the Oakland County Cooperative Purchasing Program.

Council authorized the purchase of 4 4 breathing apparatus for a cost of \$8,500 and 6 air cylinders at a cost of \$3,570 for a total cost of \$12,070 from Apollo Equipment Company as the sole source supplier.

Council authorized the purchase of 2 patrol vehicles for a total of \$45,740.00 through the Oakland County cooperative purchasing program.

Council received and filed the Farmington Employees' Retirement System Actuarial Contribution Report.

Public comments were heard.

Council adopted a meeting schedule with City Boards and Commissions for 2000.

Council set a Special Joint Meeting with the Cities of Farmington, Farmington Hills and the Farmington Public School Board on February 23, 2000 at 7:00 p.m. at the William Coetich Activities Center.

Council adopted Ordinance No. C-659-1999 to amend Traffic Control Orders Chapter 4, by adding Section 4.5 subsection (b) as provided for in Section 31-196 of the Code of Ordinances, "Parking Regulations".

Council adopted Ordinance No. C-660-1999 to amend Traffic Control Orders Chapter 4, by amending Section 4.7 as provided for in Section 31-196 of the Code of Ordinances, "Parking Regulations".

Council adopted Ordinance No. C-660-1999 to amend Chapter 5, Add to Section 3.5 as provided for in Section 31-196 of the Code of Ordinances, "Prohibited Parking".

Council approved the Monthly Payments Report for December 1999.

Zepp's goaltending sparks Whalers

Zepp, Zero, Zilch.

That's how much success opponents have had the past month against Rob Zepp, the Plymouth Whalers' suddenly unbeatable goaltender.

The 18-year-old draft pick of the Atlanta Thrashers won his ninth-consecutive start Wednesday night, knocking away 28 Guelph Storm shots in the Whalers' 4-2 victory.

The win — Plymouth's 13th in its past 15 games — improved the Whalers' record to 21-14-3 heading into this weekend's two-game set against London (away) and Belleville (home).

Zepp's Haack-like streak has ignited the Whalers, who have risen from the depths of mediocrity to contenders in the Ontario Hockey League's West Division. Entering Wednesday night's game, Plymouth trailed the division's top team, the Sault Ste. Marie by just six points.

"Great goal-tending," Plymouth coach Peter DeBoer answered, when asked to explain the key to his team's recent resurgence. "Rob Zepp has played outstanding the past month. He's leading the league in goals against (2.32 going into Wednesday's game) and is near the top in save percentage.

"He's definitely been one of the main reasons we've been able to turn things around."

The Whalers welcomed back defenseman Shaun Fisher Wednesday night. Fisher, who resembles Jaromir Jagr in his pre-haircut days, returned to the ice after missing a month with a broken forearm.

Shaun is the quarterback of our power play, so it was nice to get him back," DeBoer said. "We played very sound defense tonight, and Shaun had a lot to do with that."

Guelph goalie Craig Anderson matched Zepp's flawless net work for the first 20 minutes Wednesday night, turning away all eight first-period Whaler shots as the two teams battled to a scoreless tie. Zepp had 13 saves in the opening period, three of which came in a 16-second flurry with just under five minutes to play.

Plymouth's George Nastas finally broke the scoring ice just over two minutes into the second period when he rifled in a power play goal off a feed from left wing Eric Goolby.

The Whalers doubled their lead less than two minutes later when left wing James Ramsey outthrust two Storm defensemen to the puck just inside the blue line, then threaded a pass to Rob McBride, who backhanded a shot past Anderson.

Guelph dented the Whalers' lead at the 7:51 mark of the second period when center Joe Gerbo — the smallest player on

the ice — one-timed a pass from Kevin Mitchell past Zepp.

The Storm's Lindsay Plunkett re-directed a Mitchell shot past Zepp's outstretched blocker to tie the game at 2-2.

But the Storm's gain in momentum was short-lived thanks to Plymouth's Justin Williams, who aided a rebound shot into the net from short range with 8:33 left in the second period, making it 3-2.

It stayed that way until Plymouth's Tomas Kurka stole a Guelph clearing pass, then deposited an empty-net goal with 1:02 remaining.

Plymouth racked up 17 minutes in penalties, including Jamie LaLonde's five-minute fighting major five minutes into the game. LaLonde exchanged harmless blows with Guelph's Matt House before the two were ushered off the penalty box.

Guelph was whistled for just three penalties, totaling nine minutes in the box.
