DDA shelves program to make way for something new

Apparently ready for a change, the Farmington Downtown Development Authority last week decided to whelve the long-tunning "Helidaya Around the World" program.

wish from Santa Claus. But, said some DDA members during a meeting Jan. 4, it didn't really result in booming holiday seasons ales, the time of year merchants bank on more than any other. With the aim of boosting December business, the first Friday of that month will be when the new-look holiday program is unveiled.

Although usual holiday decorations, themes and promotions will remain, the new DDA program will primarily focus on a gift certificate giveaway, intended to bring shoppers back. Approximately 80 DDA members with customer traffic (such as restaurants, retailers) will be given \$100 worth of gift certificates to dole out to holiday shoppers, said Judy Downey, executive director of the authority. The DDA will supply about \$8,000 for the certificates.
Downey and other DDA members decided it's time for a different control of the certificates. Although usual holiday deco-

ent approach to the holiday program. "Shop With Holiday Dollars in Downtown Farmington" was one suggested name for the event.

"There's a lot of competition for Santa," said Downey during the meeting. "When you're looking at an expenditure of nearly \$9,000 (from the DDA) for an event, you want to leave an impact on downtown shopping." Downey said "everybody does the same thing," namely bringing in Santa for the kids. "Let's do something that would mean dollars to our retailers."

Winners of gift cortificates would be required to redeem them at whatever store they won them at Dewney added.

To help customers make the rounds, a walking map of the downtown shopping district likely will be put together for the promotion.
