

Packing for the big trip takes a lesson in security

Now that you've planned your dream honeymoon and have the itinerary and wardrobe all set, it's time to think about packing. Other than making sure the toothbrush isn't left behind, there's often not a lot of thought that goes into it. And that can be a big mistake.

Doug Chunovich, owner of Harrison Luggage in Berkley, says a few simple security tips he learned at an FBI seminar can make all the difference to travelers.

"Never put your residence address on the outside tag, use your workplace or a commercial address," he says. A home address visible to thieves is an invitation to have your home or apartment broken into while you're off enjoying yourself.

"Put your address on the inside of your luggage, too," says Chunovich. If your luggage gets lost and the tags removed, the chances of it getting back to you are much greater if you've included identifying information on the inside.

"Always carry your money and jewelry with you. Never check it in luggage."

he says. There are passport cases and money belts which can securely hold your valuables underneath your clothing. Fanny packs, though carried close to the body, can be cut open from the bottom and emptied of their contents.

In addition, Sean Riley, owner of Humidor One Panache in Southfield, offers another bit of practical advice. "Always pack your carry-on with a change of clothing just in case your luggage doesn't end up where you do," he says.

And take the time to educate yourself on buying the right kind of luggage. Expensive doesn't necessarily equal better, but buying a substandard product can cost you in the long run.

That's why Chunovich makes it his business to educate people on buying luggage and packing for trips through seminars and an informative website (www.harrisonluggage.com).

"I've had people come in here after taking a trip that cost thousands with a \$49 suitcase that's been destroyed," says Chunovich, whose store sees more than 10,000 repairs a year. "They blame the airlines for ruining their luggage, but in fact, it's the manufacturer. Unfortunately, the industry is making a lot of garbage."

Chunovich offers the following suggestions on what to look for when buying luggage:

- With soft-sided fabrics, look for a Cordura nylon or a ballistic nylon which are both durable. Leather, though strong and durable, will scratch and scar over time. It's best to choose leather for garment bags or small pieces of luggage.
- With hard-sided suitcases, look for a full honeycomb frame which runs around the entire sides of the suitcase. It allows for flexibility when bows up against the frame, virtually impossible with a full rectangular frame.
- If the suitcase has a telescopic handle, look to make sure the case has two wheels, not one, for better maneuverability.
- To be sure the suitcase is a good value, inquire about a lifetime guarantee.
- When buying a travel bag, including a padded system and round storage bins into the suitcase.
- With stitching, look for a bag where a larger portion of material overlaps the stitching.
