After a brief discussion, during which the woman was saked several times about purchasing crack, the officers identified themselves, arrested the suspect and let other SONIC officers into

the home.

As they talked with the woman, an officer noticed a locked closet in he far corner of the bedreom and heard movement coming from inside. When they opened the door, officers said they found the woman's

Yather inside, a 12-gauge shot-gun on the floor at his feet.

He told officers he only wanted to make sure his daughter didn't get hurt. However, Nebus said, the way the closet was set up indicated this had happened

"This wasn't a one-time thing," Nebus said. "He had taken the time to make a cut-out in the

closet with a one-way mirror."

In addition, officers could tell by marks on the door frame and the lock that the closet had been ed more than once, he added.
