

# North, Harrison win season openers

Farmington Harrison and North Farmington began the 2000 girls soccer season Friday night with a pair of non-conference victories.

Junior Danielle Strickland scored three goals as host Harrison triumphed at Lakeland, 6-2, and senior Kelly Hogan scored the game-winner in visiting North's 3-2 win over Milford.

The Hawks led 3-1 at halftime, but the Eagles narrowed the difference to one goal early in the second half.

Strickland, senior Emily Jackson and freshman Alexandra Cicci scored the last three goals as Harrison won going away.

"Goalie Moira (Moroi) was talking and running the defense for us," Harrison coach Greg Strickland said.
