off season and has improved," Shenton said. "He has to adapt to learn more singles strategy, because he's used to doubles. But he has the ground strokes to take care of that."

Senior Brady Dwyer and Geoff Stroitt are the new No. 1 doubles team. They were WLLA runners-up at two doubles; Stroitt won the regional title while paired with Steve Jaffe.

They should be a very strong No. 1 doubles team," Shenton said. "They're excited about the challenge."

Seniors Josh Wool and Andy Golaszewski also move up one position to No. 2 doubles. They were state semifinalists and WLLA and regional champions at No. 3.

"At the beginning of the year, I was thinking they may stay at three doubles," Shenton said, "but they've become so good and play so well together I had no choice but to put them at No. 2 doubles."

Sophomore Rob Frankel, who combined with Jaffe to win the WLLA title at No. 4, will play three doubles with senior Brian Krieger. This year's No. 4 duo consists of senior Mike Levy and junior Greg Boothroyd.

The Raiders had a good start, winning their first dual match Monday and finishing second Saturday in the Birmingham Seashore Invitational. North was minus Berman due to injury Saturday.

"We know Seashore is going to be one of the better teams in the state," Shenton said, "so we know we can pretty much play with anybody."

Farmington Harrison
With possibly the state's best singles player on its team along with other experienced players, the Hawks are hoping to have a successful season.

Their 3-0 start in dual meets indicates it will be.

"It's going to be a fun season provided everybody can stay focused on what we're trying to accomplish," coach Carl Badnyee said.

"Our team goal is to qualify for state as a team. That will require at least 16 points, which is going to take some work since we have North Farmington and Northville in our regional."

Senior Ryan Shade returns to play No. 1 singles, and the Division 2 state title could remain in Farmington because of him.

Shade was the only player in the state to beat North's Brad Jaffe last year, and he did it twice — once in the regional final. He was runner-up to Jaffe in the WLLA tournament and was a state quarterfinalist.

Shade and Saline's Chris Mitchell are the early favorites to win the state title, according to Badnyee.

"It's there for the two of them," he said, adding Shade has matured physically. "Ryan is looking like an adult now. He's really growing up and filling out."

"He's been working out, going to agility training and working on his fitness. It's going to be hard to outshine him."

"I used to get a little worried when a match went to a third set, but his fitness level is up there now. Hopefully, all of that should pay off by the time of

states."

Senior Tim Kupferer returns to play No. 2 singles and worked on his game during the off season, too. He was a WLLA semifinalist.

"He has improved his game so much; he'll be one of the top players in the league," Badnyee said.

Senior Dan Price is another returning player who surprised Badnyee by winning the No. 3 singles flight in the recent Monroe tournament.

"He's a hard worker," Badnyee said. "He chases every ball; he runs it down, sends it back and he wins matches."

Sophomore John Kluka played doubles last year and completes the singles lineup.

"He plays brick-wall tennis," Badnyee said, adding Kluka just gets the job done. "At No. 4 singles, you need someone who will hit the ball one more time than the opponent, and John can do that."

Seniors Rahul Boinpally and Rob Platt comprise the No. 1 doubles team. Boinpally played No. 4 singles and doubles last year; Platt was out most of the season with a broken ankle.

"I think they'll be very strong; both are experienced players," Badnyee said.

Sophomore Brandon Lachowicz played one doubles with Boinpally and Plumley with sophomore Ralph Plumley at No. 2.

"They're young so any mistakes they make will be simply because of inexperience," Badnyee said.

Three sets of players will see action at No. 3 and 4 doubles — seniors Ray Welch and Rob Taylor, junior Charlie Lublin and senior Matt Pelletier and juniors Justin Jacobs and Brian Studer.

Farmington High
The Falcons had one of their most successful seasons under coach Keith Morrison last year and hope to duplicate it despite a number of losses due to graduation and injury.

Farmington finished third in the WLLA tournament (just three points behind Northville) and reached the semifinals at every flight but one.

Sophomore Chad Moore, who was unseeded but finished second in the WLLA at No. 3 sin-

gles, will play No. 1 in place of Jon Gore, who isn't able to play this year because of a back injury.

"Playing all those matches last year gave him confidence, especially in his serve," Morrison said. "The more experience he gets the better he'll play."

Junior Chris Hall was at No. 4 doubles and will make the jump to No. 2 singles. He earned that right with his year-round dedication to the game, according to Morrison.

"Chris was a beginning player his first year," he said. "He came out all summer, and I taught him how to play tennis."

"As hard as he plays, his game will only progress. He would excel in any sport with his work ethic."

Junior Shamik Trivedi, who was a WLLA semifinalist at No. 3 doubles with junior Hemant Srinivas, steps into the three singles position.

"He doesn't have a doubles partner to rely on; he has to do it all by himself," Morrison said. "If he stays focused and goes ahead and plays, he'll do all right."

Senior Dan Turkovich played No. 2 doubles last year and rounds out the singles lineup at No. 4.

"He has to go out there and hit the ball and play tennis. If he does that, he'll do well," Morrison said.

Srinivas and Raj Bedi are different kinds of players but make a good No. 1 doubles team.

"It's like opposites do attract," Morrison said. "They seem to click and work well together. They're pretty dominant when they're playing other players on the team."

Junior Harinder Gill and senior Brian Atkins are the No. 2 doubles duo. Gill was like a pinch hitter last year, filling in where needed, and Atkins is new to varsity competition.

Joe Seymour and Steven Reff are playing No. 3 doubles. They have to refine their game and learn to play the soft shots as well as the hard, Morrison said.

"That's the mental part of it," he said. "They played very well (Monday) until the North Farmington team figured out what was happening."

Twins Martin and Milan Kriepke are the No. 4 doubles players.
