Farmington City Council expected to adopt new cellular tower rules

Farmington is coming closer to having new cellular tower rules.

On Monday, the city council is expected to adopt an ordinance for cellular towers and antennas that would loosen restrictions in industrial parks and tighten restrictions near neighborhoods.

The ordinance, which the planning commission and council have already supported, would eliminate the 20-foot setback in industrial parks and add a 25-foot setback for towers in single-family zoning.

"We're trying to tighten up an ordinance for residential

areas," said City Manager Frank Lauhoff. "We're also trying to avoid having more cellular towers."

The new ordinance was designed to make it easier for Nextel Communications to add an antenna to an existing tower owned by AT&T located at the Department of Public Works on Nine Mile Road.

For Nextel's plan to work, the current ordinance must be amended to allow for more space in industrial park side-yards.

If the ordinance doesn't pass, Nextel could install its own tower on private property.

Lauhoff said the city does not receive compensation for cellular towers, unless cellular companies rent city-owned property for tower placement.

Farmington currently has only one tower and there are no pending applications for more.

Our Lady of Sorrows teacher recognized

The goals of the National Society of the American Revolution are threefold: patriotism, education, historic preservation. In keeping with those goals, the NSDAR each year searches out excellent teachers.

For the year 1999-2000 the Michigan winner from among those nominated by the 55 Michigan chapters, and named an Outstanding Teacher of American history, was Ronald Jones, teacher of 7th and 8th grade American history at Our Lady of Sorrows Catholic School in Farmington since 1973.

Jones' particular interest is the Civil War period. He has spent several summers acting as a volunteer historian for the National Park Service at various Civil War sites. As part of his classes' study, he dresses as a Civil War soldier and gives a

first person explanation of the life of a soldier. He has most of his students for the two-year period, and as a culmination of their academic studies, he leads a trip of students and adults for a three-day visit to Antietam and Gettysburg.

Jones was nominated for this honor by the Ezra Parker Chapter, Royal Oak. He was given a pin and a certificate on April 6 at the Michigan Society DAR Awards Day at Kellogg Center in East Lansing.

The principal of Our Lady of Sorrows School said in her letter of recommendation for Jones, "...In my thirty-two years in the field of education, I have never met a person so deserving of being selected as the Outstanding Teacher of American History."
