mean for better homes, for better
dressed men, women and children,
for better prices for the farmer, for
fewer unpaid bills to the merchants
if this \$400,000 could have been
spent in other lines than for drink?
Sometimes it is claimed that men
go out of Pontiac to buy liquor if
they do not buy it in the city. A
number of men to disprove the
fallacy of the argument, that just as
many people would go out of the
city to buy as buy in the saloons,
counted, one night, the men who
entered the saloons for two hours
and it was found that if a car ran
every ten minutes and carried
nothing but "Dunks," it would
not have been able to haul back
and forth from Detroit the number
of men and boys that went in the
saloons.

It is claimed, under the Warner-
Crampton Law, that if a man
wishes liquor for medicinal pur-
poses, he must pay a physician the
price of a prescription for the order
even though no medical advice,
further than the order, is given.
This, too, is a fallacy that has been
worked by the "Wet" boomers,
for, in reply to personal letters
written to the leading medical prac-
titioners of Oakland county, more
than fifty have replied that it has
not been their custom in the past,
nor will it be their custom in the
future to make a charge for an or-
der for liquor, if they grant this
order at all, unless further medical
advice and attention is given.

The increase in crime in Oak-
land county has been appalling and
unquestionably a large percentage
of this can be traced back to the
open saloon and so, for financial
and moral reasons, every voter
should cast his ballot for the
"Dry" at the coming election.
