Mountain biker has quick climb to national role

■ Dan Bowman of Farmington Hills, 18, had a goal and a plan to achieve it. A competitive mountain-bike racer, he wanted to win a spot on the United States national team. He did that recently and will compete this week in the 2000 World Mountain Bike Championships in Spain.

As Horaco Greeley suggested young men do a century ago, Dan Bowman went west to seek, not fame and for-tune so much, but a place in the sun nonetheless.

He leaves today for Spain so a member of the USA Cycling Team to compete in the 2000 World Mountain Bike Championships through June 11 in Sierra Nevada.

'I was pretty much shocked I made it, Bowman said, 'but I was happy, I achieved my goal. I'm pretty excited; it should be a lot of fun.

At the end of last year, Bowman was in his senior year at North Farmington High School, but he had enough credits to graduate early and headed for Colorado to pursue his passion for mountain biking in January.

With coordinating help from his parents and USA Cycling, he earolled at Fort Lewis College in Durango and gained a spot on the school's competitive bicycling team.

"I knew I had to come out west, because the hills are out hero." Bowman said. "In a lot of national races, you have to climb, and I just couldn't train as well for that in Michigan. "The winters are a little warmer, and there are a lot of fast guys to train with

I think it was a good move. I got hooked up with the RPM team and met my coach, Keith Darner. He helped me get into the national selection camp after the Big Bear National."

The idea of going to Colorado occurred to Bowman last December, and he set about putting his plan together. He knew what he wanted and went for it.

"I was laying in bed and thought "What if I graduate early and go out west to train?" I really wasn't going to go to college, but it gave me a place to stay and has worked out well. All my classes were done at 11:16 every day, so I had plenty of time to train."

After an early qualifying event for then national team, Bowman didn't think his chances were too good after he finished fourth.

"I just didn't have a good race," he said. "I started out pretty well and was leading on the first climb. But we caught up to the next (semi-pro) group in front of us, and I was just sitting there waiting to get up a single-track climb.

"I was going too hard off the start and had the worst cramp I've seve land in my life right under my rib cage. I had to stop and stretch it.
