Michigan Liquer Centrol Commission Chairwoman and local resident Jacquelya Stewart died Menday from a brain ancuryam. She was 59.

Stewart had a long history in politics. She became chairwoman of the liquor commission in 1997. She was an administrative commissioner before that, starting in 1999.

As a political science major at Henry Ford Community College in Dearborn, she gained some insight into politics and government. She was graduated from Oakland County Police Academy and was a former investigator with the Oakland County Prosecutor's Office for more than 15 years.

Hills police seek driver in fatal accident

S Farmington Hills police are asking the driver who struck a 39-year-old man on Nine Mile near Shiawassee late Monday to turn himself in. Because poor lighting may be a contributing factor, police plan to study the roadway.

Farmington Hills Police Chief Bill Dwyer made a plea Tuesday for the driver of a vehicle that killed a 39-year-old Hills man to come forward.

"I can't emphasize enough, it's in the best interests of this person to come forward now." Dwyer said. "It will make a big difference."

Stoven Groan was struck and killed at 11:47 p.m. on Monday, June 19, on Nino Mile Road near Shiawassee. Witnesses reported a black sport utility vehicle was traveling at or near the posted speed limit. Dwyer said the podestrian may have been on medication and wandered into the roadway.

Soaring prices spur thefts at gas pumps

Higher prices at local gas pumps may start to come down at the end of this week, according to a spokesperson for Mobil Oil company.

According to David Bailey, public affairs director, repairs to a pipeline in Jackson Country got gasoline flowing into the metro area Fridny, but spot outages and prices in excess of \$2 a gallon were expected to continue through the weekend.

Were doing everything we can, 'he said. 'Supplies are very short.'

Pump handles were covered at gas stations on 12 and 13 Mile roads in Farmington Hills last week, after operators simply ran out of gas.

When asked whether the shortages contributed to searing prices Bailey said. 'Price is set by supply and demand. So you can draw your own conclusions.'

Police believe continuing high prices may lead to 'an increase in gas-related thafts. Hills Assistant Chief Chuck Nebus has already seen more reports of people who drive off without paying for their gasoline purchases.

"Tve been noticing there's a couple of fail-to-pay cases almost every morning,' he said. 'We're definitely going to see an increase in that. Typically, they're younger people or people with not enough



money."
Gas stations experiencing drive-offs may start to require customers to pre-pay, Nobus said. Some already require pre-payment after dark.
Hills police are also investigating two cases in which thieves siphoned gasoline from parked trucks. A construction company and a car dealership both reported the theft serlier this month.
In the first instance, someone driving past the

Lack of information prompts dissension over water/sewer rates

Leaving a few unanswered ques-tions, Farmington Hills City Council members voted Monday night to approve changes in water and sewer

rates. Questions about minimum billings and significant changes in the rate components prompted councilwoman Vicki Barnett to vote sgainst both a water rate increase and a cut in sewer rates, while councilman Chris McRae opposed the water rate. "The problem is the rates are being set June 19 effective July 1, and we don't have time to get additional numbers," McRae said. 'I feel hamstrang. So the only thing I can do is

Jean Barrett, assistant to the director of public services, explained several factors affect the water and sewer rate calculations. The city contracts with Detroit Water and the Oakland County Drain Commission, rather than establishing its own water and sewer departments.

A 35-cent increase in Detroit water rates, coupled with financing a new water meter reading program, led to a hefty \$1.23 rate hike proposal. However, the county drain commission suggested using the interest carnings from the city's water supply
