

Established in 1829, the congregation met in homes and built its first structure on the corner of Shiawassee and Warner attroots in 1844. The first prachers were circuit ridors in the early tradition of Methodism.

Interfaith Association in 199899. The church also hosts the


Farmington area CROP Walk for Hunger annually.
First United Methodist Church counts 343 families, or 547 members. Summer services are at 9:30 a.m. Sunday, From just after Labor Day until middune, Sunday services are at 9:30 and 11:15 a.m. The Rev. Sondra Willobee is associate pastor; Carolon Wilk heads Christian education; and Jan Wassilak is the choir director. Longtime organist Joan Haggard rotired last Sunday. Two part-timers will fill in until a replacement is found. A parish visitor, office administrator and secretary round out the staff.
Farmington First is a Christ-centered sanctuary actively committed to love one another, teach Christ, enjoy worship, heal the hurting, n'ture families, serve where called and welcome all.
Pastor Large came to First United from 14 years of campus

ministry with the Wesley Foundation in Ann Arbor. He had spent 33 years in the ministry.

An addition to the sanctuary was added in 1988 and houses the education unit. A major renovation/building project is just getting off the ground. The \$1.2 million project will include barrier-free entrances and washrooms, an elevator to serve three levels, additional class and meeting rooms, and improved and largor youth activity areas, Facility improvements include insulated roofing, central air conditioning, electrical upgrades, enhanced sanctuary lighting and added storage space.

"We are meeting with the architect this week. We hope to have bide out by mid July and project completion a year from September," said Large.
