# How Livonia, Plymouth Rate On Riot Tension

"It's as bad a stareotype to talk about "THE white suburb" as to talk about "THE Negro," siys Donald I, Warren, who has made a lengthy study of how the setubris - including Livonia and Plymouth -- reacted to the 1967 Detroit riof. By Dr. Warren's standards -- those of a liberal sociologist -- Plymouth and Livonia rank-do low in racial tensions, high in problem solving efforts. That was good.

His mail survey convinced him that all suburbs aren't him that all suburbs aren't alike, just as all Negroes, teen-agers or Episcopalians aren't alike.

ABOUT 100 FAMILIES In Plymouth city and township and another 100 in Livenia received questionnaires from the control of the University of Michigan's School of Social Work, located in the Frieze Building of the Ann Arbor campus, It was here that Warren, a tousied-haired young man in a sports shirt was interviewed about the results.

DR. WARREN studied nine

DR. WARREN studied nine communities. Reading clockwise around the map of Detroit, they were:
Southgate, a downriver town on the road to Toledo; Dear-orn; Plymouth; Livonia; South-filed, just northeast of the Observeriand suburbs; Royal Oak and Madison Heightis, in south-eastern Oakhand County. Warren and East Detroit, in south-ern Macomb County. None is less than 99,5 per cent white. The sociologist asked people about their perceptions of the 1957 Detroit riots in "oositric and for reactive and "negative" terms, and how people thought their neighbors were reacting to racial tensions.

FOR EXAMPLE, the amount of tension was measured by purchase of guns, attendance at meetings on race problems, reading of pamphlets, contacting of police and training with

reauing or pampures; contacting of police and training with guns.

On this scale, Southgate showed the highest degree of race tension; 35.4 per cent of the respondents said they observed their neighbors actually reacting in one of those ways to race tension;. Other high-tension cities included East Detroit (32.6%), Partborn (32.4), Warren (30.5%), Dearborn (32.4), Warren (30.6%), Dearborn (32.6%), Livenia (32.6%), Madison Heights (36.5%) and Royal Call (34.6%). Thus, Plymouth and Livenia ranked sixth and seventh, respectively, in degree of racial tension at the beginning of last summer.

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# Black, White Causes Of Riots

What are the causes of riots? Ask suburbanites in nine towns that are more than 99 per cent white, and you get one set of answers. Ask middle-income Negroes in Detroit and you get another. Dr. Donald Warren of the University of Michigan came up with these responses in his May-Juna surveys:
