Mrs. John Richardson, chairman of the dress drive, explained: "In recent years many ladies have dressed dolls for the Goodfellows Baskets."

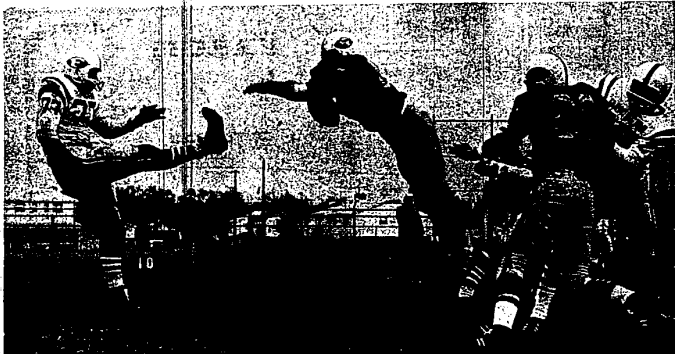
"The response has been so overwhelming to this project, that many women who would like to participate have not been able to do so because there are just not enough dolls to go around."
