Mall Opening Features Stars Of Radio, Stage

Patrons who attend the three-day Grand Opening "Happy-ning" at the Tel-Twelve Mall, 12 Mile and Telegraph, Southfield, will find entertainment and attractions for all age groups.

The Grand Opening ceremony will be at 9:30 a.m. on Thursday, Nov. 14, but elaborate entertainment will continue through Saturday, Nov. 16.

Following the brief Grand Opening official ceremony, Bud Gwert and Charlie Parks of WJR will appear in the Fashion Court to meet fans and give autographs. Guest will return to the Tel-Twelve Mall at noon on Friday for a second autograph session.

A fashion show, featuring the latest fall and winter wear from the various fine women's shops and departments in the Mall, will be held from 2:30 to 3 p.m. on Thursday and Friday, Nov. 14-15, with Jackie Cramp-ton of WJBK-TV, narrating the show.

DURING THE three-day opening celebration, the following "Happy-ning" will take place in the Mall:

At 11 a.m. and 3 p.m., Red Ace, also known as Staley the Clown, will stage balloon sculpture shows. The star of many national television shows will twist balloons into various forms and distribute them to his fans.

From 1 to 1:30 p.m., the fabulous Ginny Tis Revue will be presented. The Ginny Tis show is hailed by nationally-known critics as "the finest import from China since tea."

The Ginny Tis Revue was a show stopper when it was presented in Carnegie Hall in 1966. It will be on the Jonathan Winters Show on Christmas Day, 1968.

During the three days, Eddie Santini, nationally-known orchestra leader, will present two shows daily. One, from 4 to 4:30 p.m., will feature Santini's "Sounds of Today" Show while the other, from 6:30 to 7 p.m., will feature Santini's "Dixieland to Big Bands" Show.

WHILE ALL of the theatrical fanfare is going on, Sinozo the Clown will circulate through the Mall and stores, giving imprinted balloons to children. Sinozo's activities will take place without interruption from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily.

From opening to closing of the Grand Opening "Happy-ning," beautiful hostesses will circulate through the Mall to give information and pass out folders detailing features and facilities of Tel-Twelve Mall Centers.

And, what would a Grand Opening "Happy-ning" be without searchlights?

Klieg lights will be utilized during the three-day celebration from dusk to 9 p.m., acting as a visual reminder of the Grand Opening and as location beacons.

New Library Science School

ANN ARBOR -- The University of Michigan will establish a School of Library Science beginning next July 1.

The U-M Regents approved Friday a plan which will separate the present department of library science from the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts and create a new unit with its own dean and administrative staff.

The recommendation by Dean William Hays of the Literary College and Allan F. Smith, U-M vice president for academic affairs, came after an evaluation of the library science program here by leaders in the library profession.

WHILE THE LIBRARY science curriculum is based on liberal arts training, it was noted that the courses in library science are technical and professional in character, and have little contact with other work being done in the Literary College.

Potential librarians seek skills which are marketable in the operation of public libraries, schools, colleges, and industry, and they tend therefore to be homogeneous in interests and objectives.

It was also cited that of the 11 universities in the nation which are accredited by the American Library Association to offer the doctor of philosophy degree in library science, U-M is the only one without a separate professional school. Students here can also

earn masters' degrees in library science.

LAST FALL U-M had 451 students in library science -- a figure exceeded only by the University of Pittsburgh's 495. Moreover, of the 247 doctoral degrees which American universities have awarded through August 1967 in this field, 60 were awarded by Michigan.

The School of Library Science will become the University's 18th school or college. Vice President Smith and Dean Hays

ANN ARBOR--What will the real estate business be like the rest of 1968?

"The best four months in Michigan's history," says Dr. Karl G. Pearson, director of real estate education at the University of Michigan and professor in the Graduate School of Business Administration.

Dr. Pearson says his optimism is based on a survey of real estate brokers and salespeople across the state, particularly in the 27 localities where the University is conducting its statewide certificate program in real estate.

THE RECENT CONSTRUCTION strike slowed the pace of real estate transactions only temporarily, he insists. "In these last four months of 1968 we are not only going to have to make up for that lost strike period, but we are also going to have to meet an expanding

demand exceeding all our expectations."

The growing demand for real estate may be typical of the country as a whole, but Michigan has some unique factors working in its favor, according to Pearson:

"We are seeing more transfers of key men in business to new plants, new offices, and new projects than is true of the average state. This mobility makes for a sale in the home left behind and a purchase of a home in the new place of transfer."

Dr. Pearson, who came to the University from dean of the Rider College School of Business in Trenton, N.J., credits a part of Michigan's advance to the role of women in real estate:

"Perhaps I have a natural prejudice in favor of women in the real estate business," he says, "but I have never been in a state where they have been so active as in Michigan."

"I have to attribute part of Michigan's advance to them. The women in real estate have been the strongest supporters of our certificate program in real estate education."

IN ADDITION to Michigan's share in the World War II baby crop, which has now grown up and is demanding homes, is the factor of education. Says Dr. Pearson: "I like to think that our educational program in real estate at The University of Michigan has helped make the state's practitioners better qualified."

"There are just two qualifications to attain the very profitable income which real estate can supply: You must be willing to work harder than you may have done before, and you must nowadays be qualified by what you have learned in real estate education."

"I cannot emphasize too strongly that the public today expects the real estate man to have complete knowledge of his product--land and its improvements."
