Livonia Ladywood, gunning for its 10th Catholic League championship in a row, secured the first-place tiebreaker with co-leader Birmingham Marian on Thursday by outlasting visiting Farmington Hills Mercy, 16-11, 11-5, 15-5. The Blazers, 18-13-6 overall and 7-1 in the Central Division, open defense of their crown beginning at noon Saturday at Madison Heights Bishop Foley. They will face the first-round winner between Mercy and the AA Division's No. 2 seed. The finals will be Thursday, Feb. 14, at Madonna University.

"Because of our youth, we can can sometimes hit nine to 10 balls out any game," Ladywood coach Larry Wyatt said. "Good defense and ball control have to be there, but I'm confident we can get the job done."

Mercy, taking Ladywood to three games in a Jan. 23 meeting before falling, appeared to have momentum on its side after winning the second game. But Ladywood senior Desiree Betts opened the third game by serving six straight points, including two of her four aces on the night.

Mercy coach Ed Ruhl then called a timeout, but couldn't stem the tide against the host Blazers.
