This is one of the few communities which takes diversity and inclusion seriously, "aid Daniel Krichbaum, executive director, of The National Conference for Community and Justice.

Krichbaum was the keynote speaker Thursday at "Progress Report to the Community," sponsored by the Farmington/Farmington Hills Multicultural/Multireaid Community Council. The event was held at the William Costick Center in Farmington Hills.

Located on East Jefferson in Detroit, NCCJ is a nationwide organization dedicated to fighting bias, bigotry, and racism through education, advocacy, and conflict resolution. It works with local businesses, schools, police departments, religious congregations, community agencies, and government offices to help people learn how to live and

work in a diverse society.

Krichbaum pointed out that the United States census indicates the country continues to be segregated.

There's a difference between diversity, which is the first step in getting to know one another, and inclusion, he said.

"Inclusion goes a step further," Krichbaum said. "You can have a diverse community, but are they represented in a business, corporation, or institution at every leved?" Do the vendors represent African-Americans, Arab Americans, Jewish Americans, and women?"

Although those present at the MC/MR meeting are willing to speak to the issues, their neighbors may not want to address these subjects as willingly, he said.

Krichbaum facilitated discussion among the school and city officials, residents and representatives of community groups who attended.

Participants, through their group lenders, expressed a need to reach out further into the community while emphasizing strengths already put in place. Schools have played a vital role in celebrating diversity, they said.




