Businesses honored for not selling

While leaving Monday night's
Farmington Hills City Council
meeting, Pony Express restaurant owner Richard Skinner
proudly clutched a plaque with
noe hand and shook hands with
police Chief William Dwyer with
the other.
"This is a great idea," said
Skinner to Dwyer, about the
public recognition given to the
Eight Mile Road establishment
and approximately 40 other

and approximately 40 other Hills businesses, including restaurants and stores.

They were honored for not providing underage decoys with alcohol, tobacco products - or either - during police depart-ment compliance operations last

year.
"It's an excellent reminder and motivator" for businesses to stay on track, replied Dwyer to the restaurant owner. According to Skinner, "This gives us something to put up on

the wall and show our staff (and customers) that this is serious staff. ... We get punished if we do something had, but this gives us recognition for doing something good.

The plaques were co-awarded by the city, police department and Farmington/Farmington Hills Commission on Children, Youth and Families.

Most of this year's awardees have regularly complied with the Hills police department's alcohol and tobacco "sting" operations, which have taken place since 1986 and 1998.

Since those efforts began, the sales of alcohol and tobacco to minors have decreased significantly in Farmington Hills, Dwyer said.

At the beginning of the presentation, the Rev. Mark Summers, chairman of the commission, recalled how he and other
children in his neighborhood
regularly visited a store.
Summers said it was assuring
that, whenever the store owner

noticed youngsters involved in something they shouldn't be, he'd call parents to inform them about it.

"We'd like to re-enforce that attitude," Summers continued. "And honor the businesse who have been responsible. We want to recognize their part in helping raise children in an honest and responsible manner."

In his comments to the council and awardees, Dwyer explained the importance of the business community keeping minors away from alcohol and tobacco. "Sevently-five percent of smokers start by the time they are 18," Dwyer said. The members of our business community have a big job, and you are on the front line, charged with the responsibility and accountability to stop minors from purchasing alcohol or tobacco. At one time or another, you have probably saved a youngster" from serious injury, death or health-related consequences.
