By tallying a surprising number of e-mail messages, phone calls and even a few old-fashioned and fondly-received letters, we're ready to announce the winning performances to be reprised in an all-music edition airing 5:30 p.m. Thursday, June 7.

It came as no surprise that Detroit legand Marcus Belgrave was a favorite in the jazz category. He's made five appearances on the show, each time performing with different artists. For the viewers' choice program, he'll be joined by the Jeff Haas Trio and Israeli violinist Miri Ben-Ari.

A bit unexpected was the pick

in the pop/rock genre, with Edwin McCain's performance of his huge hit, I'll Be, selected. Voters reached back a couple of years to pluck this goodie. Also making the list of favorite musical moments were gospel's Angie Smith and Don Mayburry and a tremendous recent performance by jazzman Joshun Redman. Ready for the top vote getter? The Backstage Pass crew was pleased with the choice because it is an outrageous one. The Original Parliament delivered pure funk along with much spectacle, and it was rewarding to discover that the excitement we were experiencing in the Channel 56 studio had been effectively transmitted to the small screen.

Getting a music performance
to sound and look its best on
television is an art in itself. Defily handling the sound on Backstage Pass is music producer Ron
Pangborn. Meeting the challenge
of capturing the mood of the performance, whether sultry jazz or
frenzied funk, is the specialty of
director Tim Daniellan.
With a group like Parliament,

I encourage our camera operators to have a little fun, because that's what I intend to do. Shoot from a weird angle. Zoom in on the wild hat or the flying feet. Because flash is an essential part of the act, when we try something new, it seems to work,' says Danielian, who just captured his third Emmy from the Michigan Chapter of the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences for multi-camera studio direction on Backstage Pass.

Part of Tim's expertise is the ability to practice restraint.

"When you have someone like the immensely talenteed Joshua Redman wowing everyone during rehearsal, you realize that every decision you're going to make in the control room must complement the performance. I'm in constant communication with audio technicians and camera crews to make sure our production enhances the music and doesn't distract."




