the discus. She won both events at the Catholic League meet.

Telford has the school records in both. Her season bests this year were 38-9 in the shot and 129-0 in the discus.

"She's the best thrower I've ever had," Mercy coach Gary Servais said. "It'll take two or three people to replace her. It'll be the first time in eight years we won't have a Telford on the team."

Telford, who was a scholarathlete in the Catholic League, plans to attend Loyola University in Chicago and continue her athletic career.

Anne Roosevelt, discus, Mercy: A first-year participant in the field events, Roosevelt won a regional championship and made the state finals. In the league meet, she was second in the discus and fifth in the shot put.

Her winning throw of 121-6 in the regional was second only to teammate Judy Telford on the list of area bests.

"She makes Judy Telford nervous, because (Telford) doesn't think her records are going to stay there too long," Servais said.

"It was remarkable for her to make the finals, going to the state meet for the first time.

She just kept getting better all the time, and that regional performance caused it all."

Alexia Noel, long jump, Ladywood: The junior captured the Division II state title in the long jump and set a state record in the process with a leap of 17-10.

At the Operation-Friendship meet,

Noel jumped an area best 18 feet. She also led the area with a best of 5-5 1/2 in the high jump.

Noel led Ladywood to its second consecutive regional title at Algonac by winning the long jump, high jump and 100 meter hurdles, along with running a leg of the victorious 400 relay.

She was also Catholic League A-B Division champ in the long jump and high jump. She was also a member of the first place 400 relay team and took third in the 100 hurdles.

"She's got talent and she knows what she wants," Ladywood coach Lee Shaw said of Noel. "She does what she is supposed to do every day and she's a team person. The girls look up to her."

"When she's out there, you know you're in for a tough meet."

Karen Abramczyk, high jump, Lutheran Westland: The junior was runner-up in the Division IV state meet after winning regional and Metro Conference titles. She jumped 5-4 three different times this season, breaking the school record.

Abramczyk won the high jump 13 straight meets, including three invitational, conference, regional and MITCA team meets, losing only to three-time state champion Jenny Kulcher of Burton-Atchison.

She was also a valuable 1,600 relay performer as the Warriors finished fourth in the state meet.

"Karen was a good jumper a year ago, but she worked hard at it in the off-season and improved her best by three inches," Lutheran Westland coach Dave Brown said. "As a result, her confidence

helped her in big meets, and that's where she jumped her best."

Kim Wise, pole vault, Garden City: Wise has been the best in the area over the past four seasons, showing steady improvement every year.

The senior finished second in the state at the Division 3 meet last week with a school record jump of 11-3, and came in seventh in 2000 and third in 1999 at the state meet.

Wise is a four-time state qualifier and, not surprisingly, a four-time member of the All-Observer team.

She's also a three-year Mega Blue champ and a three-time regional champ, a two-time all-state selection, was fifth in 2000 and 2001 at the MITCA meet and has won ever dual meet she's ever been in.

"Kim is the best athlete that I have coached," said Cougars coach Rob Phillips. "She is very competitive and consistent. She works hard and does what it takes to improve. She has the ability to be a very good collegiate vaulter."

LaTasha Chandler, 100 hurdles, Glenn: The senior placed fifth at the fast Division I state meet in 15.19.

She broke the Glenn school record with a second-place finish in the Ann Arbor Huron regional (14.5).

Chandler went undefeated in dual meets and took the WLAA crown. She was also a member of Glenn's first-team All-Area 400 relay squad.

"LaTasha is an outstanding athlete," Glenn coach John Kitchen said. "She is hard working and dedicated trackster who is a great leader."

Whitney Johnson, 300 hurdles, Mercy: Johnson produced some amazing results in her first year of track, setting

the school record in the 300 hurdles at 46.4 and shattering the old record of 49.1 shared by Tracy Balog and Jami Snow.

She qualified for state in both hurdle events, finishing second in the 300s and third in the 100s at the regional.

Her best time of the season in the 100 hurdles was 15.7. Johnson didn't compete in the Catholic League due to an injury.

"I think she's going to get both hurdle records before she leaves," Servais said. "I don't think she has run as well as she can yet."

"She needs to polish her technique, but she has the speed. Hopefully, she'll get better and we can teach her things that won't make her slower. Sometimes, if you get too technical, it messes things up."

Michelle Bonior, 100 dash, Salem: A senior, Bonior combined quads and sprints would check — both size and strength. Bonior wasn't just one of the fastest sprinters in the area, she also ranked among the region's best shot putters, an event she qualified for state in.

Her best time in the 100-meters was 12.6. Bonior was also clocked at 23.2 in the 200. She tossed the shot 34-feet, 11 1/2 inches.

"She was never satisfied with anything but her best performance," said Salem coach Mark Gregor. "Michelle was one of the most dependable competitors at Salem over the past four years."

"She never made an excuse and always came to compete. Her senior season was filled with outstanding performances."

Krystal Wise, 200 dash, Harrison: Just a freshman, Wise made an impact in her first year of high school competition.

Her time of 27 seconds in the 200 was one of the best in the area, and she was the Farmington public-school city meet champion in the 100 and 200.

In the WLAA meet, she was sixth in the 200 and third in the 100. She was a member of Harrison's regional-champion 400 relay team and state-qualifying 800 team.

"Krystal is very talented and hard-working," Hawks coach Mark Bobcock said. "She's very mature for a ninth grader. We're looking forward to great things from her in the future."

Alexandra Marshall, 400, Mercy: Marshall broke her own school record in the 400 with a time of 57.4 and a fourth-place finish at the state finals.

She's the Catholic League champion in the 100, 400 and 200; she also qualified for state in all three, as well as the 1,600 relay. Marshall was second in the 100 and 200 at the regional and third in

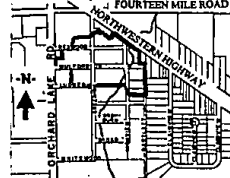
