It's hard not to get attention when you're riding a uni-

cycle. David Brichford of Farmington Hills, along with sever-al members of his family, will be among the performers in the July 21 Founders Festival parade in downtown Farmington.

Once you get the hang of it, unicycling ian't much hard-er than bicycling, said Brichford, 42, who's been a unicy-cler since he was 12. "You have to lean forward and pedal fast enough to keep it underneath you," Brichford said of unicycling. But he added, "You can fall off a unicycle in any direc-tion."

Redistricting may send Rocky packing

.homecomm.net State Rep. Andrew Raczkowski is still considering a bid to run for the U.S. House of Representatives and serve a proposed congressional district that would include western Oakland

that would include western Oakland and Wayne counties. Receixowski's residence of Farming-ton Hills was not included in the redrawn congressional district approved by lawmakers last week, which is awaiting Gov. John Englors signature. This means Raczkowski, who lives in Farmington Hills, would have to move in order to live within the

new district. The Republican-dominated legisla-ture controlled redistricting, but the plans could face a federal court chal-lenge from Democrats. District bound-aries are redrawn every 10 years to reflect census changes. Raczkowski said he wants to do what's in his constituents' best inter-cet.

"If I do run for Congress, it will cer-tainly be with my constituents in mind," he said. "I would never do any-thing to harm my constituents — these are the people that I love." Initially, the House Redistricting and Elections Committee was going to

vote on an amendment that would have included Farmington Hills in the redrawn district. Raczkowski request-ed removing the amendment. "I chose to withdraw because some sentors had a very definite remark that they did not want Farmington Hills on the map, 'he said. Raczkowski declined commenting on whether or not he fait the sentiment was politically motivated. Under the proposed redistricting, Farmington Hills is now within the district of Congressema Joe Koollen-berg, R.Bloomfield Hills. The popular Republican has held the sent for nearly a decade.

State Sen. Thaddeus McCotter, R-Livonia, said he is considering running for the scat, but is waiting to see how a court challenge pans out. So far he has raised more than \$100,000 for a con-gressional bid. "Obviously it would be very inviting and I would be open to that opportuni-ty," said McCotter, whose state senate district includes Redford, Livonia, Ply-mouth, Northville and part of Canton. Getting support from Oakland Coun-ty voters would be a cinch. "I think I'm already on my way towards that," McCotter said.
