Farmington officials have begun to discuss how to best get information to voters about a proposed November bond referendum for sewer line rehabilitation. Instead of tearing up pipes, they'll line them to prevent leaks.

Formington city officials have stort-ed putting together the details of a public information plan, as they pre-pare to ask voters to borrow \$1.8 mil-lion for a sever liner project. The liner would be designed to improve the condition of the primary

whistowney treatment system, outcame and. If the voters approve the ballot ques-tion Nov. 6, the cost will-be assessed against property, said Farmington City Manager Frank Lauhoff. If the voters reject the ballot ques-tion, the cost could be included in water rates.

The pipe has no major rehabilitation since it was built in 1957. "The engineers have ovaluated the condition of this pipe and significant defects in numerous areas have been found," The current condition of the pipe required that action be taken as soon as possible to rehabilitate this sewer interceptor in order to assure that it continues to operate efficiently and repair costs are kept to a mini-um."

The repair is estimated at \$2.5 mil-lion. A liner is expected to improve water flow and help eliminate storm back-ups. "City council has determined that the recommended repair done at

this time can be accomplished at a sig-nificantly reduced cost versus the actu-al digging up and replacing of this sever, Lauhoff said. Residents of historic north Power Road suspect that a looming 27-home construction project will change the designated Natural Beauty Road forev-

designated Natural Beauty Road forev-er. "That will change Power Road dras-tically," said I reno Kernicky, a long time resident who has served on the neighborhood homeowner's association. "It's all woods and streams right now and that's going to be gone." Some say that after fighting the development since 1994, neighbors are resigned to the project.
