The Livonia Clarenceville running back had already run for 224 yards on just seven rushes Friday night in the Trojan's 46-6 victory over Lutheran Westland. He upped his state record touchdown total to 105 with scoring runs of 62, 21 and 68 yards as the Trojans (6-0, 5-0) scored the first six times they had the ball and seven of their 10 first-half possessions.

The Trojans were even into a little trickery as Coach Greg Hudkins begins the countdown to the playoffs.

Quarterback Pete Shaw lined up with his back to the lines and the ball was snapped to a deep back, who then pitched the ball to Shaw so he could sweep to the right and throw a pass downfield. In this case it worked for a 14-yard gain to Bill Nesbitt.

"We scored a touchdown of that play last week," Hudkins said. "When I played in college

we played Denison and they used the old single wing."
So Hudkins adapted it to his own personnel — and it's clearly a play that's going to cause somebody problems in the post-season when used at a critical juncture.
"We've got smart kids," Hudkins said, "so we can make some adjustments. We still use the same basic plays."
Pete Shaw had a marvelous passing night, completing all passes he threw — six to his team and one to Lutheran West-land. His throws gained 114 yards, including a 34-yard touch-down toss to Stevo Mendows.
Meadows had runs of 1- and 29-yards for secores while Aaron Alliaon had a 1-yard scoring run. But while Tim Shaw's touch-down exploits may be getting him attention all over the state and country, they aren't attracting much notice just down the

## Glenn nips Central in overtime thriller

Westland John Glenn fans and players stormed the field and mobbed each other, along with the man of the hour — Andrew Peiffer — following Friday's 24-21 overtime triumph over host Walled Lake Central. Glenn's effort was workmanlike for sure. The Rockets had trouble running the football against Contral's jammed up-defensive front. Glenn complied only 31 yards in 35 attempts, but went to the air as junior quarterback Brina Cecklewicz enjoyed his best day in a Rocket uniform, completing 13 of 21 passes for 228 yards.

Glenn got the ball first but was forced to go for a Peiffer field goal following a 4-yard run by De'Anthony Granberry and two incompletions.

Central then took the ball and was stuffed by a fired up Glenn defense on two rushing plays, resulting in just 3 yards.

Viking quartorback Ryan Trailer (six of 13 for 149 yards) then oyed 6-foot-2 wide receiver Maxx Morris, who had caught the go-ahead TD on an 11-yarder with 1:53 left in the third.

With Glenn unable to stop Central's sweep, the Vikings scored first on Scott Longs 10-yard TD run with 9:35 left in the opening quarter.

Granberry's 2-yard run made it 7-7 with 7:56 to play in the accond quarter. The Rockets scored again on their next possession after Bennie Oliphant recevered a fumble at the Vikings 27.

Three plays later, Peiffer caught a 15-yard TD pass from Ceckiewicz.


