The existing four-year employee contracts don't expire until June 2002. Each unit is covered under Farmington Michigan Education Association agreements.

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said.

"The best way to explain this is that it will cost the district 3 percent in new money spread differently through the schedule based on education and level of experience," said Ton Chrzanowski, president of the teachers' union.

"We're proud of the extension. It shows the good relationship between the school district and the union. It went very quickly because we truly frust each other. We didn't fight about it.

We did it in four or five meetings. We didn't see any need to change the existing language. That doesn't mean we both wouldn't like some changes." There isn't the same type of dissension between labor and management as 20 years ago, Chranowski said.

But I don't want to characterize that we are the only ones getting along with management, he said. "Other districts are doing so also."
