Stanton connected on nine of his first 10 opening-half passes for 229 yards.

Agin Shabab caught two of his passes for scores covering 8 and 63 yards. Dave Condeni also had an 8-yard TD reception.

The speedy Woods, a junior, scored on TD runs of 3 and 2 yards in the first half. He finished with 69 yards on 13 carries.

Glenn got on the board with 6:24 left in the first half when backup quarterback Brandon Ajlouny came in and hit Andrew Peiffer with a 27-yard pass on fourth down.

But by then the damage had already been done with Harrison comfortably ahead 27-7.

Glenn moved the ball at times and had some positive yardage on kickoff returns.

The Rockets tried a fake punt at the Harrison 47 late in the second quarter, but Peiffer was cut down just before the first-down marker by Woods, who was filling in for the injured Bill Richeson at linebacker.

"Marcus was the right man for the job because of his speed," Harrison said. "We're missing two of our starting inside linebackers and a defensive end, but the guys who stepped in did a good job."

The Hawks wasted little time in scoring two more TDs in the third quarter as 5-8, 165-pound fullback Steve Wolff made his only carry of the game count on a 35-yard draw play, followed by Woods' third TD of the night on a 3-yarder.

"Nobody has the speed to match up with their offensive

weapons," said Glenn coach Chuck Gordon, whose team was outgained 366-176 in total yards. "They're a great football team. They're good."

"You just can't try and stop them with the run, because they'll throw and they'll go with more than just one receiver. They're multi-dimensional. Their quarterback is a great football player. He'll stand in there and throw it with pressure."

Harrison, averaging just under 50 points per game, is anchored by a solid senior offensive line.

"We don't have any superstars, but the line has been outstanding so far," Harrison said. "What we look for are unselfish people who can execute the fundamentals and work hard in the weight room. We call them the 'Grubbers.' They are the kind of the guys who just love to be a part of the team."

Tackle Dan Bannister (6-0, 217) and guard Jason Lynkip (6-1, 200) both started a year ago. Senior Dan Derocher (6-0, 200) moved in at center, while new-camers Justin Armour (6-3, 250), a tackle, and Pat Corcoran (6-0, 180), a guard, have more than solidified an underrated unit.

"Derocher has done a good job converting to center from tight end," Harrison said. "Justin Armour is a big kid who did not play at all last year but has done a good job for us. "I never worry about the offensive line, because coach (Bob) Sutter is the kind of coach who can build a line with whatever talent he has."

It's 14-0 before Liggett has even run a play from scrimmage.

The Knights got one first down, then Glenn Garrant picks off a Jeff Legree pass to set up a third Trojan score.

Meadows gets a 1-yard touchdown run at the end of a 73-yard drive to make it 21-0 — and the first quarter isn't even over.

The Trojans' defense is on the field for three plays plus a punt and Clarenceville (8-0, 7-0) mounts yet another scoring drive. Tim one is 58 yards, capped by a 10-yard Tim Shaw scoring run.

Two plays later backup quarterback-safety Josh Silvernail intercepts another Legree pass, and Meadows winds up with a 7-yard touchdown.

Liggett (6-2, 6-2) fumbled its next possession away on the second play, and Tim Shaw finished off a 31-yard drive with a 4-yard scoring run. It was 40-0 at halftime.

Tim Shaw added a 69-yard scoring run with 10:22 left in the game for the only points of the second half.

The second half was played with a running clock, and Clarenceville kept its first string in for much of the second half.

It wasn't an animosity thing; it was just Hudkins trying to get his team ready for a long playoff run.

"I let the guys play a little bit longer," he said, "and I'll probably let them play a little bit longer next week against Cranbrook, too."

"Liggett played OK. They have some decent athletes."

Tim Shaw gained 245 yards with his 13 carries, while Meadows had 94 in 13. Pete Shaw threw for 84 yards, going 6-for-13 with one interception.

Clarenceville was a little sluggish in spots, not that the scoreboard noticed. But it made some mistakes it won't be able to get away with once it gets into the playoffs.

The playoff point standings show Clarenceville at the bottom of Division 6, just a handful of teams standing between

the Trojans and a berth in Division 6. As additional teams qualify, Clarenceville will slide up or down.

Hudkins has figured there are 22 teams his Trojans could face in the first round either in Division 5 or 6. He'll have slightly less than half scouted this weekend.

After that, it's up to the players.

CHURCHILL 8, FARMINGTON 3 (OT): Jason Martel booted a pair of field goals, including the game-winning 20-yarder in overtime to give Livonia Churchill (2-6) the WIAA crossover win Friday over the host Falcons (0-8).

Martel stalked the Chargers to a 3-0 lead with seven seconds left in the second quarter on a 27-yard field goal. David Thayer's fumble recovery set up the score.

Farmington's Nate Meyer tied the game with a 27-yard field goal in the first period.

The Falcons threatened to go ahead with four minutes left in regulation with a first-and-goal situation at the Chargers' 8, but Thayer caused and recovered a fumble.

Churchill had first-and-goal at the Farmington 6 late in the game, but the Falcons' Troy Szabo came up with a fumble recovery.

In OT, Churchill lineman Alex Murray picked off a screen pass to set up Martel's game-winning field goal. Churchill had 145 total yards to Farmington's 138. Churchill also had the edge in first downs, 9-0. Each team lost two fumbles.

Senior Steve Nakamura led the Chargers with 100 yards rushing in 19 carries. Quarterback Mark O'Hara was three of seven for 28 yards and one interception.

Anthony Luttman led the Falcons with three receptions for 31 yards, all first downs.

W.L. WESTERN 35, STEVENSON 13: Big plays were the difference Friday as Walled Lake Western (8-2), outgained host Livonia Stevenson (4-4) in a WIAA crossover battle of third-place divisional teams.

Steve Bell carried the ball only five times but rushed for 165 yards for the Warriors. Steve Van Nortwick added 69 yards on 15 carries.

Bell opened the scoring with a 72-yard TD run at 10:59 in the first quarter. Stevenson countered with 3:04 left in the half, tying the game at 10 on Bill Maraske's 45-yard touchdown pass to Bill Williams.

In the third quarter, Western struck for 14 points — Jon Michael on a 45-yard pass to Bryan Kowalek and Bell's 39-yard TD run.

Field goal dooms Rocks to another defeat

For the second-straight week, a field goal did in Plymouth Salem.

There weren't a lot of differences between Salem and Livonia Franklin Friday in a Western Lakes Activities Association football crossover.

Just one: Andy Siefert.

A senior and former soccer player at Franklin, Siefert booted a 24-yard field goal with 5:33 left in the first half, and that proved to be all the Patriots needed to beat host Salem 3-0 at Central Middle School.

The win boosted Franklin's record to 3-5, Salem 1-7. "I know he was going to help us out," said Franklin coach Chris Kelbert of Siefert. "He's done a tremendous job for us."

Siefert's kick capped a 60-yard drive. The Rocks did answer, or nearly did. In the closing seconds of the half, they managed to march inside the Franklin 20, but the drive ended there as time ran out.

The game was moved from Salem's home field to Central Middle School on Friday morning due to poor playing conditions.

Although both offenses moved the ball, the defenses took command when they had to. Franklin gained 218 yards on offense; Salem had 184.

"Our whole defense was flying to the ball," Kelbert said. "After the first hit, there were five or six guys there to finish it."

Ryan Allam supplied most of the offense for the Patriots. The

6-foot-1, 250-pound senior running back gained 107 yards on 19 carries.

"He's a truck," said Kelbert.

"They were all tough yards." Ryan Haynes added 48 rushing yards on 13 attempts. Quarterback Seth Baldwin completed two eighth passes for 37 yards.

Scott Hewitt, Salem's senior quarterback, provided a great deal of the Rocks offense as well. Hewitt completed 4-of-11 passes for 32 yards, with one interception, and he rushed 12 times for 51 yards.



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
