

Marlins advance to semis

BASKETBALL

Farmington Hills Mercy advanced to the semifinals of the Catholic League girls basketball tournament Wednesday with a 47-35 victory over Allen Park Cabrini.

The Marlins will play Birmingham Marian at 6 p.m. Tuesday. The other semifinal game will match Madison Heights Bishop Foley against Harper Woods Regina at 7:30 p.m. Both games will be played at Schoolcraft College.

The championship game is scheduled for 4 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 4, at the University of Detroit-Mercy's Calihan Hall.

Megan Garagiola and Alexandria Marshall scored nine points apiece to lead Mercy (16-7) against host Cabrini. Deirdre Jones, Anne Roosevelt, Whitney Johnson and Barb Maczka added six points apiece.

Garagiola also had 15 rebounds and Roosevelt eight. Marshall and Jones made five steals each.

The Marlins trailed at the end of one quarter, 12-7, but they outscored the Monarchs in the next two periods combined, 28-16.

Roosevelt scored six straight points in the second quarter to get Mercy, which led 19-18 at halftime, back in the game.

"We played much better in the second half," Mercy coach Kristin Wright-Guinn said. "We went to a man-to-man, full-court press in the second half, which

provided some pressure for them and opportunities for us to score. "We just played better. We got the ball inside more and we ran the offense better than we did in the first half."

Megan Garagiola carried us in the second half and helped us to win the game. She scored all nine points at the free throw line. She was getting fouled and making free throws."

Bonnie Baker scored 18 points for Cabrini.

SALEM 37, FARMINGTON 27: The Falcons played well against the Western Lakes Activities Association's regular-season champion Rocks Thursday at Farmington.

Julie Kimmel scored 13 points and had nine rebounds to lead the Falcons (4-7, 8-2). Jaris Atkins added eight rebounds and Deanna Gauer seven.

"Julie Kimmel played a really tough game," Farmington coach Scott Lowe said. "She got a tough knock through a tip out came back and played. She went to the hospital and got stitches afterward."

The Falcons played well on defense against the No. 5-ranked team in the state, he added.

Farmington was ahead after one quarter, 12-8, and only trailed by a point at halftime and the end of three periods, 23-9 and 26-25.

"The kids played really hard against them," Lowe said, "but we also had two officials who made it five against seven."

"Salem is a really good team; they're

state-ranked for a reason. But it's tough for a school like us to play five against seven.

"You can't play Salem and only have four fouls against them. The kids from Farmington played really well, and I'm proud of them."

MaryLou Liebau scored 13 points and Kelly Jeskot 12 for Salem (15-0, 17-0). **HARRISON 50, CHURCHILL 28:** Despite a homecourt loss Thursday to Farmington, Harrison, Livonia Churchill is in the field of eight for the WLLA girls basketball playoffs.

The Chargers, 6-10 overall, got in on a breakever as the seventh seed. They will face Harrison again in the first round on Tuesday. Game time is 7 p.m. at Harrison.

Churchill, Farmington and Livonia Franklin all finished with 4-7 WLLA records, but Franklin lost out because of third-quarter scores.

Franklin beat Churchill but lost to Farmington. Churchill defeated Farmington. None of the top six WLLA seeds. Harrison, the No. 2 team, is 10-7 overall and 10-1 in the Western Lakes. The Hawks roared out to an 18-1 start against Churchill.

"We couldn't cope with their defensive pressure," Churchill coach Rod Windle said.

Senior guard Aiyana Richmond led Harrison with 20 points. Senior forward Deanna DeRoos scored 13 for the Chargers.

CLARENCEVILLE 37, HAMTRAMCK 29: Jessica Leach scored 11 points and Marissa Martin grabbed 11 rebounds Thursday to lead Livonia Clarenceville (3-12, 2-6) to the Metro Conference triumph over the visiting Cosmos (0-17, 0-9).

Jessica Gasior had seven for Hamtramck, which led 21-20 at halftime.

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"I'm very proud of our kids because they believed in themselves — they came into this game confident after a great week of practice," said third-year Dundee coach Cory Gildersleeve, whose team bowed out at 6-4 overall. "I thought for the most part we executed very well. But four or five mistakes early-on cost us."

"But it was just too much Shaw and Meadows. That Monday is one heck of a blocking back. We just got hit with the toss sweep, and we couldn't get our linebackers in there fast enough to get to Shaw."

Clarenceville jumped out to a 6-0, but with 8:16 left in the first quarter on Tim Shaw's 8-yard TD run.

The Trojans scored again early in the second quarter on sophomore Jeff Fioretti's 8-yard run followed by Meadows' two-point conversion.

Dundee, however, began to find gaping holes in Clarenceville line as Gildersleeve ran 64 yards for a TD. Ted Ruth followed with a 6-yard TD run to make it 14-12 after Shaw was stopped on fourth-and-1 at his own 35 with 1:22 left in the half.

(Dundee had its extra point blocked and failed on two-point conversion after the second TD.)

In the third quarter, Shaw scored again on a 42-yard TD run, but the Trojans couldn't convert the extra point (blocked again).

Dundee tied it at 20-all with 7:22 to go in the third quarter on Gildersleeve's 16-yard option run followed by his 2-point conversion pass to Dan Fogate.

Clarenceville, however, tacked on two more third-quarter scores.

Junior Pete Shaw hit Adam Carpenter on a 30-yard TD pass set up by Tim Shaw's 38-yard third-down halfback pass to Glenn Garrant.

Shaw then whipped around end and down the sideline for 85 yards to make it 32-20.

Dundee countered early in the fourth quarter on Gildersleeve's 2-yard keeper and subsequent two-point run, cutting the deficit to 32-28 with 10:40 remaining.

Shaw then began to grind it out as the Trojans drove 83 yards in 10 plays capped by the Shaw brothers potent air combination — Pete to Tim — for the final 36 yards on a nice over-the-shoulder grab with 5:05 to go.

The march consumed 6:30 of the clock.

Despite the frigid cold night and choppy winds, Pete Shaw was five-of-eight for 92 yards. Meadows added 61 yards in 10 carries.

But afterwards, Hudkins was scolding about his defense, which yielded nearly 400 yards in total offense.

"I don't want to take anything away from Dundee because their staff did one heck of a job preparing for us both offensively and defensively," the Clarenceville coach said. "But against their option we didn't keep any of our responsibilities. We weren't even close."

"We'd make two mistakes every play, even the ones where we stuffed them. Everything we do in practice we did completely different tonight. We had missing assignments all night long. We

had guys lining up in the wrong spots."

Ironically, the Trojans gave up more points on this night (28) than they did all season (26). Clarenceville can't afford to make the same defensive mistakes as it awaits the winner of Saturday night's Erie-Mason vs. Beverly Hills-Country in the other Region 3-District 1 matchup.

Clarenceville will host the winner of that game at 7:30 p.m. this Friday.

CANTON 9, NOVI 7: That wasn't the wind you felt gusting from the direction of the Plymouth Canton football field Friday night.

It was a collective sigh of relief by fans of the Canton football team following the Chiefs' 9-7 victory over Novi in a first-round Division I playoff game.

Following an incredibly successful 8-1 regular season in which Canton's night football team would have been entitled "Entertainment Tonight," Friday night's escape against the Wildcats was more like an episode of "Survivor."

The victory propels the 9-1 Chiefs into the district championship game against Walled Lake Western Friday at Canton.

"It's funny, but last year I would have been ecstatic with a win like this," said Canton coach Tom Bender. "But this year, the expectations for this team are so much greater it seems like you can enjoy it for a few minutes and then it's time to move on to the next one."
