POLICE CALLS

ARMED ROBBERY ARREST
The armed robbery Oct. 25 of a Farmington Hills 7-Eleven store ended in a five-mile car chase and arrest of a Redford Township man, 18.
The man put a cookie on the counter, then announced a hold-up at 11:50 p.m. at the store at Nine Mile and Farmington Road, according to Hills police. The man ordered employees to give him money from the cash drawer, but ran out when a customer entered, and got into what witnesses said was a red car.
Hills police spotted a red Firebird at Eight Mile and Grand River, tried to stop it, but the car backed into the police car and sped away. After a five-mile chase, Livonia police "stop sticks" caused a flat tire at Eight Mile and Middlebelt. Police cars were then used to ram the car and stop it.
There were no injuries in the incident. Police said the suspect told them he had been doing "speed, marijuana and crack

cocaine" throughout the day.
CAR BREAK-IN
A CD Walkman, car stereo speakers, CDs and a man's Citizen watch, all valued by their owner at more than \$3,000, were reported missing from a 1992 Chevy Cavalier parked at 1:31 a.m. Oct. 24 on Colgate Avenue in Farmington Hills.
Hills police said a passenger window was broken, causing \$250 in damage. A rusted socket wrench was likely used to break the window, as it was found on a seat inside, the incident report stated.
ASSAULT AT SCHOOL
Hills police are investigating a possible felonious assault Oct. 24 during lunch at Harrison High School when a male, 17, held a small knife against the stomach of a girl, 15.
According to the police incident report, the boy did not cut the girl, but pressed the blade of a combination mechanical knife and lighter against her stomach under a table as they sat with a

group of students.
The girl said she eventually moved away from the boy, waited for the bell to ring, then told a teacher of the incident. The report did not say if the boy had been charged.

Farmington Public Safety officers arrested a 19-year-old Farmington Hills man about 6:30 a.m. Oct. 20.
The police officer pulled the man over for driving his 1990 Chevy Beretta 81 mph in a 30 mph zone on Farmington Road near South Manor.
The man told police "he was being stupid the way he was driving," the report said. He said he was going to a friend's house on Birchwood having just left a convenience store.
Though he denied drinking, the suspect told the officer he had marijuana. Police found two Baggies with marijuana as well as a paraphernalia case stuffed under the back seat.
