"We're trying to cater to the older people, who know what they want and want someone to install it for them," Stanecki said. 'I may not be able to beat a price, but my price always includes installation."

In addition to residential work, the Southfield native's company handles commercial installations, working with companies like Kmart and Fantastic Sam's.
