

# 'Slave' case ends as mother is released

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The case of the Farmington Hills couple charged with keeping a Cameroonian teen a slave in their Farmington Hills home closed Thursday, as wife Evelyn Djoumessi was allowed to go free after serving 183 days in jail.

Oakland Circuit Judge Alice Gilbert sentenced Djoumessi to three years probation, with the last nine months of that term to be spent in Oakland County Jail, with credit for time already served.

Her attorney will be allowed to ask that no additional time in jail will be served, if she meets the terms of her probation.

Judge Gilbert ordered Djoumessi not to have any hired help in her home for the next three years.

"I was stunned, I'm very unhappy with the sentence," said Assistant Prosecutor Cheryl Matthews. "The judge basically sentenced her to being a parent which is something people choose."

"I'm disappointed that the judge didn't give her any jail time," said Hills Police Chief William Dwyer, considering the case police built against the Djoumessis. "We're pleased with the conviction of the husband." Joseph Djoumessi was convicted

Sept. 7 of one count of third-degree criminal sexual conduct. Both he and his wife were also found guilty of one count each of third-degree child abuse. The charge carries a maximum two-year sentence. Joseph Djoumessi was sentenced to 9 to 15 years in prison.

Fridine Fru, now 19, went to live with the couple, originally from Cameroon, when she was 14. She testified that Joseph Djoumessi raped her, that she wasn't allowed to attend school,

that she was forced to live in a dingy basement, and that she had to perform chores around the home and care for the couple's young children.

Fru and authorities who removed her from the home accused the couple of enslaving her.

Fru's situation was revealed to police through a neighbor, to whom Fru passed notes.

She testified she developed the courage to challenge her situation while watching an episode of the Monte Williams TV talk show, which dealt with rape victims.

Prosecution witness Joseph Cho, a Detroit teacher and cousin of Evelyn Djoumessi, testified that Joseph Djoumessi confessed to him he had raped Fru after coming home drunk.

acquainted with Perez, whom they believe visited Machek Oct. 20 at his home on 13 Mile between Northwestern and Inkster Road.

Dwyer said a felony warrant was approved by the Oakland County prosecutor on a charge that Perez, a University of Michigan-Dearborn student, fraudulently used Machek's credit card at a Birmingham hair salon three days after the suspected murder.

Dwyer said there are also outstanding warrants against Perez on charges of impersonating a police officer and violating pro-

bation in a domestic assault case. Police believe Perez tried to obtain money from Machek's bank account after Oct. 20.

Police are offering a \$5,000 reward for information leading to Perez's capture. Police showed a video of a man believed to be Perez passing through Metro Airport security Oct. 24, three days before police began their investigation.

Art Grover of the FBI said Perez is believed to be in Mexico, near Tijuana, and authorities are communicating with law enforcement officials in Mexico in hopes of apprehending him.

"The family has been cooperative. We believe there are people that have information on the suspect," Dwyer said.

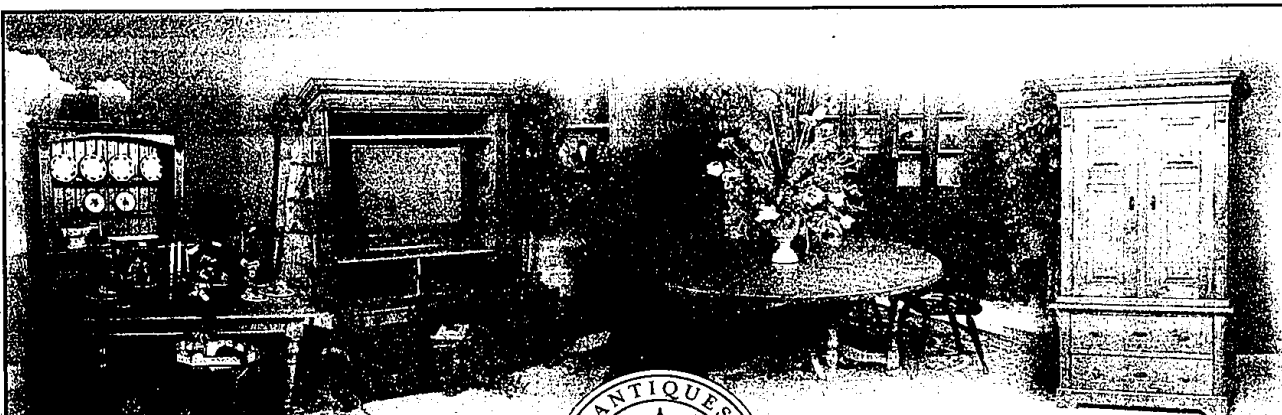
Police showed several pamphlets confiscated from his residence, on subjects including surviving as a fugitive. Dwyer said the crime is believed to be premeditated.

Perez is described as 5 feet 6 inches and 140 pounds with a muscular build.

Police are also searching for a trunk taken from Machek's home. He was reported missing Oct. 27 by his vacationing roommate after he failed to answer

calls or voice mails over several days.

Upon entering the home, police saw no obvious signs of a struggle, but police technicians determined there were blood spatters. Police believe Machek was murdered in a first-floor room and his body placed in a black steamer trunk, which missing from the home. Investigators say it was dragged to the garage, placed in a van, and driven to a location where it was likely dumped.



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
