

RU spoils Clarenceville debut, 58-50

It was first-game basketball at its best — or at least at its most obvious — as Redford Union doubled up Clarenceville in the second quarter to wind up with a 58-50 win over the Trojans. "It was ugly but it was competitive," said RU coach Brett Steele. "It was all of an early-season game. Both teams played hard, but neither one played great. It was a battle for 32 minutes."

The Panthers held a slim 10-8 lead after the first quarter and kicked it in gear in the second to take a 26-16 lead at half, thanks to Fernandez Bryant scoring 12 of his 17 points for the game. The Trojans outscored RU in the second half, 34-32 but it wasn't enough for a team still trying to make the transition from football to basketball.

"I thought we played hard and played great," said Clarenceville coach Kevin Murphy. "But we only shot about 20 percent from the paint. And we only had about five practices heading into the game, since only two of our 11 kids didn't play football." Freshman point guard Greg Hill had a fine start for the Panthers, scoring 17 points and adding six rebounds, eight assists and three steals. Shawn Meyers and Randall Taylor added nine points and six rebounds each.

Tim Shaw led Clarenceville with 14 points, while Andrew Shaw had 12 — including a pair of 3-pointers in the fourth quarter to pull the Trojans within five — and Glenn Garrant added 10 points and seven rebounds. Steve Meadows also had 10 points and seven boards. "I thought Shaw and Meadows both played well," said Steele. Overall, they pressed us most of the game and their 1-3-1 half-court trap gave us problems. We anticipated it, but we just didn't handle it well."

UD-JESUIT 60, BORGESS 53: For 28 minutes, Bishop Borgess played tight with University of Detroit-Jesuit. But a four-minute stretch of the third quarter spelled doom for the Spartans as the Cubs wound up with a 60-53 win, and they really took it to us," said Borgess coach Lloyd Pradel as his team trailed at half, 29-24. Johnny Hammond hit two 3's right away for them and got 10 of his points in the first four minutes of the quarter.

"We got settled back down and played a very good game the rest of the way. I was pleased with the overall effort. I think if you take away the four minutes, we played even or won the game. It was a well-paced game by both teams." Dulon Bryum paced Borgess with 17 points and kicked in with nine rebounds,

while Tilvan Lewis had 12 points, and Brandon Jennings and Duane Jacobs had eight each. Jennings also had 10 rebounds. Eddie Robinson led the Cubs with 16 points; Joel Woods added 14. JOHN GLENN 60, A.A. HURON 53: Westland John Glenn served an early notice this season might be a whole lot different than last.

Glenn went to Ann Arbor Huron to open the season Tuesday night and came home with a 60-53 victory, leaving the Rockets just four wins shy of matching their total for all of last year. And second-year Coach Joel Lloyd's team did it with a 17-12 record.

The Rockets started out with a 17-12 lead after one quarter and expanded it marginally to 32-26 at the half. But the host River Raisin tied the score, 43-43, entering the fourth.

Then John Glenn showed its mettle. Freshman guard Jarrett Smith opened the fourth quarter with two key assists to push John Glenn up by four in a game where the Rockets never trailed after the very early going.

In a 90-second span starting with three minutes left, junior forward Darnell Smith scored eight of his team's 14 points and younger brother Jarrett hit a pair of free throws to help the Rockets escape a 50-47 lead to 60-5.

Junior center Darnell Wilson scored 12 points; Dwight Barkwood and Anthony Harrell had 10 apiece. Senior center Ondrae Martin led Huron with 14 points.

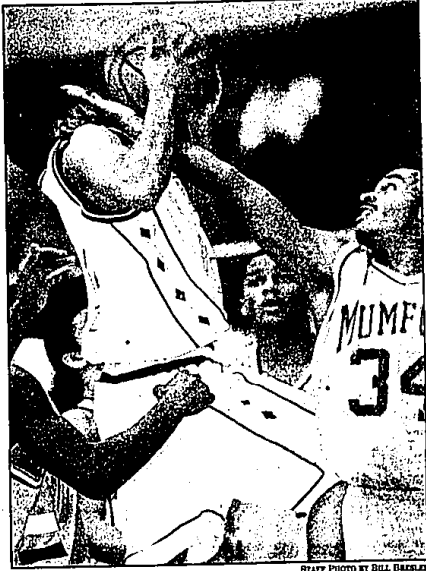
MONROE 67, SALEM 60: It's going to be a long season for Plymouth Salem's basketball team — particularly if the rest of its games take as long to complete as Tuesday's opener at Monroe. In what ended up being a turnover-filled, free-throw-shooting contest, the Trojans got the better of the Rocks from the line in claiming a 67-60 victory.

The loss overshadowed a fantastic season-opening performance by Salem junior Dave Hoskins, who lit up Monroe for 40 points — just three short of the school record of 43, set by Jim Eilinghausen in 1975-76. Hoskins also grabbed 12 rebounds while making 12-of-17 from the line, which was far better than his teammates fared.

In all, the two teams combined for 70 free-throw attempts, 45 of those coming in the fourth quarter. Monroe was 24-of-34 from the stripe (70.6 percent) while Salem made just 16-of-36 (44.4 percent). The Rocks had 33 turnovers. It sounds like a formula for disaster, except Monroe had 29 turnovers.

Salem's victory hopes suffered a setback when Hoskins joined teammate Brady Pastalanic on the bench with two minutes to play after Hoskins in double figures in points. Pastalanic was next best with seven. Monroe got 25 points from Mike Leach and eight from Pat Starow.

Salem will have a little time to work on its problems. The Rocks don't play until Tuesday, when they host Belleville.

gins and Mackler," Negoshian said. "Stitt hardly had any minutes, but he started and did a great job, too. I was pleased with all the kids off the bench."

North had six turnovers in the first quarter against Mumford's pressure. But the Mustangs had more (nine), and the Raiders were able to break the press more often than not with enough passes. Mumford backed off the press in the second, and the North was more than willing to go up and down the floor.

It was 17-11 after one, and the Raiders were only down two, 30-28, until late in the second. Moore hit a three and Enrique Hopo (11 points) converted a fast break after a missed three by North in the final half minute to give the Mustangs a seven-point

halftime lead, 35-28.

"Our big thing is we have to be pressuring the ball all over the court, and we have to do that for 32 minutes," Negoshian said.

"We're not big enough to stand still in the half-court game. We'll find out after the non-league schedule. It might be something we have to do. But I'm not sure we can now."

"We don't have a choice about that (faster) type of style. But we still try to isolate the post; we just do it with smaller kids." Leach scored 13 points in the third quarter as North outscored Mumford, 21-14, and squared the team totals at 49 apiece heading into the finale.

Leach might've had 15 in that period. He was set to shoot two free throws but appeared woozy from the foul and left the court. Zak replaced him and made both shots to tie the score, 49-49. Leach returned to start the fourth quarter and added another eight points.

But the Mustangs got up, 56-49, when Walker hit a three and Daniel Robinson (14 points), a pair of layups to start the fourth. Mumford took a 10-point lead midway in the period, 64-54, and the closest North got was four points, in the final half minute, 72-68.

"I told the kids there were things they did that were outstanding and there are things we need to work on," Negoshian said. "In the half court, we didn't get to the blocks correctly and (Mumford) found the open man." "Down the stretch we panicked a little and took some shots we shouldn't have taken and to their (Mustangs) credit they made some shots."

Mumford was 28-of-61 from the floor with five threes and 14-of-23 at the line. North made 22 of 64 field goals with two triples and 22 of 35 free throws.

LAKELAND 64, STEVENSON 49: Five game mistakes cost the Spartans' shot at a victory. They took a 35-23 lead into the fourth quarter, but miscues and an untimely technical foul on a Spartan player gave Lakeland the lead, the momentum and the win.

Junior Brendon Chitwood scored 15 points and had five rebounds for the Spartans while seniors Matt Barnitz and Nick Eberhardt added 10 apiece.
