THE CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS ORDAINS

Section 1.

The Farmington Hills City Code, Chapter 34, Zoning, Article XXII.,
General Provisions, Section 34-539, Accessory Buildings and Structures,
Subsection (bX2), is hereby amended to read as follows:

(bX2) Detached accessory indicated to rean as follows:

(bX2) Detached accessory buildings or structures shall not be located
within six (6) feet of any rear lot line and shall not be located
closer to any side lot line than the minimum side yard setback
required in the district.

Section 2
The Farmington Hills City Code, Chapter 34, Zoning, Article XXII,
General Provisions, Section 34-539, Accessory Buildings and Structures,
Subsection (bl/4), is hereby amended to read as follows:
(bl/4) In no instance shall the combined floor area of all accessory
uses and buildings exceed sixty (60) percent of the ground floor
area of the residential dwelling unit or seven hundred fifty
(750) square feet, whichever is greater.
