Set Bond On Ditch Debate

Occupancy permits for Kensington Manor apartments are expected to be granted soon, following an Oakland Circuit Court agreement providing for a \$10,000 surety performance bond on the drainage ditch controversy.

Judge Philip Pratt has ruled that the bond will be held until Circuit Court determines whether the developer is responsible for a drainage ditch between the apartment complex and Farmington Oaks subdivision.

CITY OF Farmington officials have said that occupancy permits for the apartments, located east of Farmington Road, south of Nine Mile, would be retained until the open ditch had been converted to closed drainage.

The developers, Morrice and Norman Bezons, contend that they are not responsible for the drain enclosure.

City officials contend that city engineers had approved site plans for the complex with a provision that the drain be enclosed.

Surveys of the property have found that the ditch is not located on apartment property or subdivision property, but on a 15-foot strip owned by the city.

CITY MANAGER John Dinn told The Enterprise & Observer that the city acquired the property about six weeks ago on a quit claim deed.

No court date has been set on the drainage ditch trial, but city officials said that it will be at least six months before the trial is held.

Apartment developers will forfeit the \$10,000 bond if Circuit Court determines that they are responsible for enclosing the drain, Dinn said.
