The Raiders played well in a tournament at Saginaw Valley State University and have the ability to compete with everybody in the city tournament. Calanchi said.


"We're not as big as Farmington, but we should be faster and serving tougher," she said. "We should do well if we show up to play. Hopefully, they'll get up for every game.


