keep topping the amount, to keep the dome full." The plan is to replenish the Nine Mile Rond facility whenever it gets down about 50 tons, he

About 450 tons of salt were het over from last year. So far, 150 new tons were ordered.

"Farmington represents "a semall and purchase," compared to other municipalities, Richards said. He cited difficulty obtaining bids this year.

"Farmington City Council approved a price quote of \$57 a fron for road salt at its Dec. 3 meeting, Richards said, The low bid was swarded to Dale Osburn Inc. of Taylor.

"H's three times as expensive no matter how you slice the pie," Richards said.

The other bidder was Cargill of North Olmsted, Ohio at \$50.40 a ton.

Farmington and other cities in a local consortium had diffi-culty obtaining salt this year. They complained and asked for an investigation by both Attor-

Knollenberg (R-Bloomfield

"Hopefully this thing will correct itaelf," Richards said.

from the state's contractor next
year although the city hasn't
done so for about a dozen years,
Richards said.

"Our intention is to go with
the state bid next year," he said.
