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NEW USE FOR ELECTRICITY

Current is Now Being Utilized for the Purpose of Securing Larger Chickens.

"At a chicken farm near London a scientific expert is conducting the experiment of rearing chickens by electricity, the object being to raise larger birds. High frequency electricity is used. As this is the kind used in wireless, it happens that what sounds at first like mad messages is being widely distributed to the perplexity of regular stations and numerous amateur operators. The electrified chickens are treated, it is said, with about five thousand volts, the current alternating from positive to negative ten thousand times a second. "One effect," says the experimenter, "seems to have been to make the electrified chickens pugnacious, bickering among themselves to a reprehensible extent, the unelectrified ones remaining perfectly placid. The reason is probably that this exuberance of spirit is the result of the effect of the electricity on the blood, which possibly has been made to flow more freely through the brain, and, of course, the other organs as well. It appears to be something like feeding them with oxygen, but without any ill after-effects."

The electricity is similar to that used in wireless telegraphy and the chickens do not feel it any more than do wireless operators. The message sent out by the chicken electrifying installation is a continuous buzzing very insistent in tone and seeming to demand urgent attention.

SHOWING NEED OF POVERTY
