RINGLING CIRCUS

Great Spectacle of "Joan of Arc" Added to Their Show

Ringling Brothers' Circus and newly added \$500,000 spectacle of "Joan of Arc" will exhibit in Detroit Monday, June 24. History records but the meagre facts of this strange heroine of eighteen years, who led the armies of France victorious through English invasion, and then, deserted by all, even the indolent monarch whom she preserved, died by the cruellest torture known with the name of the master upon her lips. Unsung in poetry the name of this simple peasant girl has come down through the ages to be revered as that of a saint, and whose wonderful powers and whose bravery are verily believed to have been of divine inspiration.

On the triumphant incidents, the victorious engagements, the final defeat of the English armies, and the coronation of Charles VII, all achieved by the frail Maid of Orleans, has been founded the inspiring spectacle which gives Ringling Brothers' circus a new significance and makes an attraction such as the world in searching for amusement has never before found.

Carrying Spare Valve Parts

It is always a good plan to carry a package of extra spare valve parts, such as valve insides, valve caps, washers and dust caps, says the Michelin Tire expert. These can be bought for a few cents and are at times invaluable. The small rubber tipped valve inside, which is really the valve proper, sometimes leaks when old. It can be screwed out readily by inverting and inserting the notched valve cap and using it like a screw driver. When the valve inside is removed it is only the work of a moment to fit a new one.

A leaky tire valve is sometimes responsible for a fault blamed on a "slow puncture." When pumping up a tire if the pump handle comes up of itself after pushing down on the inflation stroke a leaky valve may be looked for. If the motorist carries a spare set of valve parts he is all right, but not so his less thoughtful neighbor who left his in the garage.

The motorist early in the season should provide himself with a good tire repair kit including a supply of Mastic, a can of cement of good quality, some inner tube patches in assorted sizes and a

blow out or inside envelope patch. The red inner tube patches are generally conceded best. Those of pure para rubber, not containing fabric, the edges of which are beveled are to be recommended.

COUNTRY TOUR ON MOTOR CAR

Possibility of the Future That Seems Likely to Be Pleasant and Popular

The camping-out automobile ought to be a popular vehicle in the future. With provision for transforming the seats into a mattress covered bed, with cooking apparatus supplied with fuel from the gasoline tank of the car, and with a tent fourteen feet in length ready for use whenever night overtakes the tourist, there should be a new pleasure in country trips. Good inns are not too frequent in the United States, so that there is much to be said in favor of carrying one's sleeping and cooking accommodations in the automobile. It is reasonable to suppose that in time to come some manufacturers will advertise cars thus equipped. Obviously the opportunity is great for the ingenious adaptation of space and multiplication of conveniences.—Providence Journal.
