Pelzer addressed 250 gathered for the annual Child Abuse and Neglect Council of Onkland County Circle of Friends lunch, at Glen Oaks Country Club.
The victim in a notorious child abuse case, Pelzer was removed from his mother's home at 12 with the help of his teachers and a caring county social worker. He flourished in his new life, as he was decorated for his military service during Desert Storm and was named an Outstanding Young American in the early 1990s.

"I started to realize it wasn't all my fault," he told the social workers and Circle of Friends supporters on hand for the program.

The author once nominated for The author once nominated for Pulitzer Prizo said he was nearly killed six times before age 12 by his mother. The most danging abuse involved her locking him in a bathroom with an open ammonic container. To survive, he wetted towels in the toilet, wrung them out and pressed them to his face to breathe. Pelzer said the fumes permanently damaged his esophagus, although it wasn't obvious from his speech.

Now married with a 15-year-old son, Pelzer tours the country as a motivational speaker.

He said that amid 38,000 child abuse cases in California, he was ranked by authorities "the No. 1 most abused."

But Pelzer uses his own experience as an example to his audience that anyone can rise to overcome extreme setbacks. He said his social worker Mrs. Gold encouraged him, telling him, "I expect the best from you. "Pelzer said acknowledging the abuse helped him recover. "The more I got it out, the more of a weight was removed off my shoulders,"

he said.

At the conclusion of a court trial which freed Pelzer from his abusive mother, Mrs. Gold presented him to the judge and said, "If he can overcome all he did, I flow there is a place for our little Dave," he recalled.

"He's on the spot," commented Larry Burker of Sterling Heights after the address, duly Griffin of Farmington Hills said she attended because she's read all three of Pelzer's books about his life. 'What he went through and he survived; he's dedicated his life to helping others help themselves."

It took repeated visits to city council meetings by Hempel and her neighbors to get some attention. At first, "They listened to the builder but not to us." Hempel recalled. ruling was overturned in the city's favor in December.
Williams said the court schedule allowed for a 30-day appeal period. When that period passed Friday with no auccessful appeal, the demolition proceeded Monday.

Now that the house is down, Hempel said, "I'm thankful we have a city that listens to the residents. I'm thankful that this is going to be resolved in a way so that no one is going to live in that house and have a health problem from things that occurred there."


