

WLA-A-leading Rocks spike Falcons for win

Plymouth Salem's volleyball team out-shone Farmington's even though both were missing a star.

The Rocks defeated the Falcons, 15-13, 15-7, Wednesday night in a Western Lakes Activities Association Lakes Division showdown.

Salem played without leading front-liner Mary Lou Liebau, while Farmington was minus its top front-line player, junior Jessica Janowicz.

"She's our best outside hitter," Falcons coach Alex Perrin said of his ill front-liner. "She's all-city on the right side and we missed

her. She's also our best blocker." Liebau was on the bench watching because she missed practice the previous day.

"Katie Good stepped up," Salem coach Tom Teeters said. "She really helped (on the attack). And (Kelly) Jaskot did a good job digging. (Maggie) Tudor and Susan (Woodard) stepped up and Mandy Bradley had a great game."

Salem (27-3, 7-0) survived a scare in the first game but scored the first seven points of the second and 10 of the first 11.

Farmington (22-9, 4-2) overcame a five-point deficit in the first game on the strength of five straight points served by Julie Kimmel.

The Falcons took a 7-5 lead before junior Tudor served eight straight winners for the Rocks to put Salem on the brink.

But Kelsey Guibert retaliated with six straight winners for Farmington, pulling the Falcons up to 14-13.

Bradley had four kills for Salem while Jaskot had a nice string of four in the second game. Jaskot also served two aces while Guibert served six winning points in the match.

"We were almost missing Bradley," Teeters said. "She was in a minor car accident, and we

had to get her mother's permission for her to play."

Teeters shuffled the lineup to cover for Liebau. Tudor covered in the back row while Junior Bradley played up front. Junior Tiffani Erickson did some serving in place of Liebau.

"We scored more points on Salem than anyone else in the league has," Perrin said. "That's a silver lining sort of thing. We had them on the ropes in the first game."

"They couldn't stop (junior) Deanna Gauer. She had eight kills and hit .600. Plus, she was outstanding in blocking. Jocelyn Atkins was also on the list of good performers."

Kimmel had four kills for the

Falcons and Meghan Young three. Guibert served eight winners in the match, while Kimmel and sophomore Lisa Hillebeck each had an ace. Randin Brown had 16 assists.

In the exhibition third game, Salem rolled to a 15-1 victory as Guibert served eight straight points and Maggie Jones seven.

The Falcons did a good job of preventing long point runs by the Rocks in the second game, but they were unable to follow their sideouts by scoring points.

Salem's longest string of points in the second game was three, but Farmington failed to score more than two in a row before giving up service.

Farmington Hills youth is 2nd in Winter Junior Championship

Franklin Racquet Club has hosted 22 Winter Junior Championship tournaments, and the most recent one, completed last week, was tremendous, according to tournament director Steve Kirschbaum.

"It was probably one of the best tournaments we've ever had," said Kirschbaum, a long-time head professional at the well-known Southfield tennis facility. "There was great competition and it was just a great event."

"I hope in the future more and more people come out and watch this tournament," he said. "It's great tennis and there's a load of

talent here. It creates a great amount of excitement, and it's all for free."

Of interest, Theresa Logar of Rochester Hills captured a championship. Michael Kaufman of Farmington Hills was a runner-up and Matt Christian of Troy was a consolation champion.

Logar, who has won over 60 matches this season while climbing to a No. 15 ranking in girls USTA play, claimed the prestigious 18-under crown with a three-set victory over Ohio native Jessica Kirkland. The top-seeded Logar dropped the first

set, but bounced back to take the title, 4-6, 7-4 (7-4), 6-3.

Logar also registered victories over No. 8 seeded Elizabeth Lumpkin in the semifinals (6-3, 6-3), unseeded Megan Levy in the quarterfinals (4-6, 6-0, 6-1), unseeded Amanda Fish in the round of 16 (6-3, 6-1) and unseeded Kara Delicata in the opening round (6-2, 6-2).

Besides placing second last year (losing in three sets to Erin Burdette), Logar was the 12-under champion six years ago. Logar also won a Michigan High School Athletic Association state championship in 1999 as a freshman while representing Rochester High School.

"I was happy for Theresa after getting to the finals last year," said Kirschbaum. "It's always nice when a local kid can do well like she did."

Kaufman is another young local star who fared well.

Playing in the boys 14-under division, Kaufman lost the championship match in straight sets to No. 2 seeded Spencer Vegosen, 6-7, 3-6. The North Farmington High School freshman, who was unseeded, pulled off one of the tournament's major upsets by whipping No. 1 seeded Brian Hanus in a three-set semifinal, 6-3, 3-6, 6-4.

Kaufman also defeated No. 3 seed Marc Dwyer in the quarterfinals, No. 7 seed Michael Dierberger in the round of 16 and unseeded Tyler Zonga in his opening match.

"It was a pleasant surprise to see Michael do really well," said

Kirschbaum, who is Kaufman's junior instructor.

Christian, a junior at Birmingham Brother Rice High School, captured the consolation championship of the 18-under division. After losing his first-round match to No. 8 seed Mark Barry in three sets, Christian never lost another set.

Christian rebounded with four straight victories to take the consolation crown. The wins were over Ruben Gonzales (6-2, 6-3), Jack Komar (6-4, 6-2) and Colin Foster (6-1, 6-1).

In boys 16-under action, unseeded Marek Czerwinski won his first two matches over Ryan Reid and No. 4-seeded Jeremy Sonkin. The Birmingham Seaholm High School sophomore lost in the quarterfinals to No. 6-seeded Alex Kuznetsov, 7-5, 6-4.

Following are results from other local players who participated in the tournament: unseeded Howard Migdal of West Bloomfield was 1-1 in boys 14-under action; unseeded William Gardner (Rochester Hills) and Adam Williams (West Bloomfield) both lost their first-round matches, then bounced back to make it to their semifinal rounds of the boys 12-under consolation draw to finish with identical 2-2 records; Troy High School student Caitlin O'Keefe lost her first two matches in girls 18-under action; and Birmingham Senohm student Emily Wilkinson competed in the girls 14-under division where she went 1-1.
