Roses therefore have a long history, and as we enjoy them this year we may recall some interesting facts. Fossil records have tentatively identified roses as 30 to 40 million years old, and

as 30 to 40 million years old, and carvings, writings, paintings and other traces of civilization show evidence of the presence of roses. First there were wild roses species roses) that naturally continue to flourish and bloom. As they mingled with each other, new roses developed.

The actual progression is murky, but we learn that species and naturally occurring hybrids were found in the Mediternnean region some 2,000 to 3,000 years later. Either the Crusaders brought the plants back to France and England, or they were traded among monastery gardens.

At the end of the 16th century all the roses known in Europe bloomed heavily during the late spring and summer seasons only. Then recurrent-blooming roses appeared in the late 18th century.

After this, roses from China were introduced into Europe and people began to breed the flowers. From then on, new roses have been the result of intensive study and breeding programs.

The rose is mentioned in the Bible and many poems have been written about its

been written about its beauty and fragrance. It is the symbol of the passing of youth and beauty. A famous historic story concerns England's War of the Roses in the 15th century between the houses of Lancaster and York, with the Lancaster house using the rod rose as its symbol and the York house the white.

One of the most endearing stories about a rose is about the lovely Peace.

lovely Peace.

This benuty was hybridized in France by Francis Meilland in 1936 during World War II. Meilland sent budwood of Peace to Robert Pyle in the United States (the Pyle of Conard-Pyle), who introduced Peace.

introduced Peace.
The budwood was carried by diplomatic courier just hours before Germany invaded France. It was awarded the All-America Rose Society's highest honor for 1946, and the American Rose Society sponsored its christening at the Pennsylvania Society's

Rose Show on April 29, 1845.

Three days later, on May 2,
Berlin fell. Pence was presented
to 49 delegates of the United
States on May 7, 1945, the same
day as the Allies declared victory
in Europe.

All-America award was to be
presented, Japan surrendered.
Five years later, Peace won the
national gold medal from ARS
and on Sept. 8, 1951, the peace
