SEVEN BITTEN BY MAD DOGS

Four of the Karl Tibbits Family
Nye Humphrey, Gertrude
McHugh and Mrs. Henry
German the Victims.

As a result of being bitten by a dog which developed rabies five members of the Karl Tibbits family and a neighbor of Farmington township are now taking Pasteur treatment at Ann Arbor.

Mr. Tibbits, who lives over in the northern end part of Farmington township, recently brought home a cocker spaniel puppy for his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Duane Tibbits. The animal, although only six weeks old soon grew cross and finally snapped at the members of the family, biting Duane Tibbits and wife, Artemus and Norwood, also sons of Karl Tibbits, Nye Humphrey, the hired man, and Miss Gertrude McHugh, a neighbor.

Upon the advice of Dr. Miller the brain and a portion of the spinal column were sent to Ann Arbor for examination and the report received Monday was that it was an aggravated form of rabies. The victims at once all went to the University hospital for treatment.

Mrs. Henry German was severely bitten by a dog Monday at her

home near North Farmington. The animal was being urged to catch some mice which had gotten into some seed corn, when it suddenly turned upon Mrs. German and caught her arm. The lady was thrown down by the dog and badly bitten and would likely have suffered much greater injury if her husband had not been near. With a club he beat off the infuriated beast, and, we understand, afterwards killed it. No examination was made of the dogs brains for rabies, but Mrs. German is taking treatment at Ann Arbor as a precaution.

Work on Water System
