MANY GOING TO CIRCUS

Ringling Bros. Attract Unusual
Interest with Many Big
Features

Ringling Brothers' circus is attracting unusual interest this season because of its many new features and the new aspect given the show by the addition of the great spectacle "Joan of Arc." The circus will be seen in Detroit June 24 and this city and the surrounding country will be well represented as it always is when Ringling Brothers are within excursion distance. There will be a new parade in the forenoon three miles in length. The menagerie is practically twice as big as it was last year and contains many specimens of strange animal life new to American zoos. Audiences will be entertained by 375 of the greatest of Europe's circus artists.

Chief among the stars who are exploiting novelties and sensational acts are: The Ty-Bell sisters, known as "The Human Butterflies," whose remarkable aerial performance was the talk of Europe last winter; Carlos Caesaro, known as "the man with the iron head," the great Rooney family of equestrians; the Castrillon, the Hines-Kimball and the Florence families of acrobats; Joseph La Fleur, who does a backward dive from the top of the dome of the tent; the Schuman performing horses, three herds of trained elephants that are new to this country, and Capt. Huling's two troupes of trained seals and sea-lions. There are many more big acts. Novelty and freshness are the keynote of the performance and there are fifty clowns to keep the audience in constant merriment.

The great feature of the show is of course the newly added spectacle "Joan of Arc," with a train load of special scenery, costumes and

stage properties and a cast of 1200 characters. There is also a ballet of 300 dancing girls, a chorus of 400 voices and an orchestra of 100 soloists. This is the greatest dramatic and spectacular production ever presented in America, enacted on a specially built stage bigger than a hundred ordinary theatres. It is made portable so that it can be erected in the main tent each morning. This great entertainment is given as an introductory to the regular circus performance and entails no extra charge of admission.

"Joan of Arc" tells a masterful story from French history in a thrilling and dramatic way, and with the wonderful illusion of tons of special scenery and stage devices. In the great battle scene the audience is held spellbound by the realism of the scene, while the enactment of the coronation of Charles VII is beyond question the most sumptuous and inspiring stage picture ever seen.

A Cleaner and Better State Fair

By a happy thought the management of the Michigan State Fair struck the right track when the noisy Midway attractions which have hitherto occupied the most prominent point of vantage in the fair grounds along the walk leading to the grand stand, the horse races, night horse show and other events, were removed to a point down towards the Grand Trunk Sidings.

The former location of the Midway shows will be occupied by attractions for the children, a pony show and other events of an elevating and interesting character. In years past visitors at the Michigan State Fair have obtained the idea that the State Fair gave too much prominence to its Midway shows. The problem of placing this show, attended by so many, at a point which would not put

it too far away, but at the same time would remove it from the direct travel, placing it within easy reach but out of the regular line of travel. With the show in its present location and decidedly different from last year when every effort was made to purify the exhibition, it is not improbable that the attractions of this year will be even more popular with the masses. All freaks and pit shows have been refused space and the Midway will not be objectionable to the children and ladies in the future. Herbert A. Klise will have full charge of the attraction.

The state fair management by this innovation and the many others introduced for the present year has not decreased the interest in the fair in the slightest, for at the present time there have been secured one quarter more concessions than had been closed for at the same time last year, and this in spite of the fact that every catch penny device has been cut out. Only high-class productions will prevail as every concession must occupy a high priced space of at least 10x50 ft. to cost \$100 or more. The hot dog vendors will all be gone and only the best of restaurants will be tolerated, these being conducted mainly by the churches of Detroit. The state dairy and food commission will have representatives to the fair to make a careful inspection, this commission having cleaned out many last year. The fair management intends to provide a model fair for 1912 and these are but a few of the startling innovations that are to be introduced.

MONEY EATEN BY ANIMALS

Several Instances in Which They Devoured Currency That Was Recovered and Redeemed.

A farmer residing near Ogden, Iowa, drove into town one day, stopped at the hotel, tied his horses and went in to dinner, leaving his coat in the wagon. When he came out he examined the coat and found six \$5 bills missing. He accused a passer-by of having stolen the money. The passer-by denied the charge, declaring that the bills had been eaten by a goat. He pointed out the goat and said that he would pay the amount of loss if the cash was not found in the animal's stomach. It was necessary, of course, to sacrifice the goat, but sure enough an autopsy disclosed the farmer's "wad," which was forwarded to the treasury. A stockman near Galveston, Texas, sold a bunch of cattle for \$470. He put the amount in a wallet without folding the bills, so that their ends stuck out. Later in the day, while busy at something, he threw his coat upon the ground in a cow lot. Probably the money of which it had already swallowed all but \$810. The only way to recover it was to kill the calf, whereupon the \$840 extracted from the animal's stomach was sent to Washington. All of it was redeemed.
